Kathryn Maude Newman was born at South Bristol, near Canandaigua, in 1883. The years of her childhood and youth were spent in the vicinity of Naples, N. Y. She was graduated from the Teacher's Training Class of Canandaigua Academy, and entered at once upon her work as teacher in the public schools of this state. On October 14, 1908, she was united in marriage to James H. Newman. To this union three children were given. Upon the death of her husband in 1934, who had been a most efficient supply pastor in the Central New York Conference, she resumed her work in the class room. Her death occurred on July 1, 1941, at the home of her son, John F. Newman, Pastor of the Baptist Church in Watkins Glen. Funeral services were conducted by her pastor P. H. Kirkpatrick of Lodi.

Mrs. Newman lived her life on high levels. In the home, the church, the class room, the community, her life was fragrant. As a pastor's wife she was ever gracious, kindly, wise. It was always a benediction to enter the home where she modestly reigned as queen.

Following their marriage her husband served as pastor of the Methodist Churches of Burlington, Penna., Montour Falls, Elmira Heights, Port Byron, N. Y. and Mansfield, Penna. He died in Mansfield, Penna., January 31, 1911 in the fourth year of his ministry there.

Impressive funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church, Mansfield, by the Rev. Harry E. Woolever, burial taking place at Clearview Cemetery, North Cohocton, N. Y.

Mrs. Fenton will be remembered by a wide circle of friends. While her health permitted, she was most active in her Church and allied societies, giving with a lavish hand, both of her time and substance.
