Obituaries.

MRS. J. W. BRADSHAW.

At two successive Annual Conference sessions we record the death of Conference widows which had occurred some years previous, but which had not been reported to the Conference. Last year it was

the case of Mrs. L. A. Williams, this time it is the death of Mrs. J. W. Bradshaw.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Nackey Hedden, was born in Pennsylvania in 1814. With her husband, J. G. Wallace, she moved to De Witt, Iowa, in 1846 or 1847, where she spent the remainder of her days. Her first husband died in 1862 or 1863. She remained a widow until November 2, 1875, when she was married to Rev. J. W. Bradshaw, who was then a Superannuated member of the North Indiana Conference. Together on her homestead, near De Witt, Iowa, these two aged



people spent their remaining days until the death of Brother Bradshaw, which occurred May 17, 1880. After the death of her husband the sun of life seemed to slowly sink toward the horizon. It was slowly, for she lived until April, 1896, when, after a general decline of old age, she passed away at the ripe old age of eighty-two years.

At this writing her children are all dead except one son, who is living in Denver, Colorado. Her Christian integrity was maintained to the close of her life. Her funeral services were conducted by Rev. William Lease, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Her body was interred in the cemetery at De Witt, Iowa.

WILLIAM POPE HERRON.

William Pope Herron was born in Fenelon Falls, Canada, May 29, 1864, and died at Ft. Wayne, Ind., April 21, 1910. He was educated in the Fenelon Falls High School and the Vic-
