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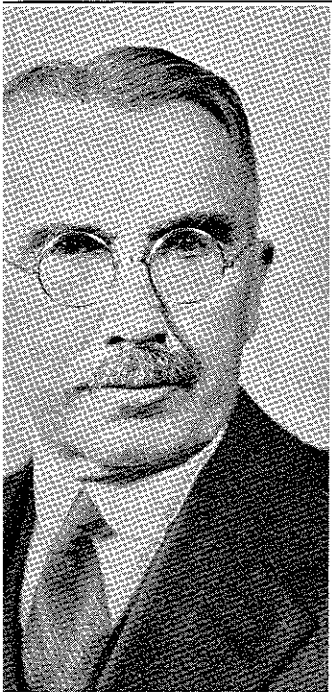

Rev. Albert W. Buck

Rev. Albert Wilson Buck, born near Cherryville, Northampton Co., Pa., January 10, 1858, was the eldest son of Adam Buck and wife. He passed to his eternal reward February 27, 1932, on the third day of the session of the East Pa. Conference. He received his education in the public schools of his native community. He was reared in an Evangelical home and became a Christian early in life. He was licensed by the East Pa. Conference as a preacher on trial in 1895, ordained deacon by Bishop William Horn in 1898, and elder by Bishop Thomas Bowman in 1900. He gave to the active ministry thirty-seven years of itinerant service on the following fields of labor,—Wayne, Port Jervis, Shamokin, Lebanon, Pottsville, Perkasio, Hellertown and Pleasant Valley, Lansdale, Orwigsburg, Bethlehem, St. Luke's, Hegins, Leighton, Williamstown, Erdenheim. He was faithful to every trust committed to him. He went to his charge last spring with a determination to win souls and build up the field,—the Erdenheim Mission. After the first eight months signs of failing strength began to appear and he was compelled to lay down the work he loved so well.

Brother Buck was known for many years as one of the sweet singers of the conference. He rendered valuable service at camp meetings, conventions and in evangelistic campaigns. He excelled as a pastor-evangelist and personal worker. He will have many stars in his crown. He is survived by his widow, a foster daughter, and three brothers.

Rev. Maurice Bowman

Rev. Maurice Bowman died December 23, 1931, at the age of 74 years, in his native village, Bowmanstown, Pa.

At the age of 20 he was converted to God and united with our Church. He was licensed to preach by this conference in 1892, and ordained a deacon in 1896 by his cousin, the sainted Bishop Thomas Bowman. He served a number of appointments. He was an influential leader and a good and faithful servant of God. He was the secretary of the Board of Directors of the Bowman Park Campmeeting Association from its organization, a period of 40 years. Since 1896 he held the relation of a local deacon in our conference.

He is survived by his widow and six children, one of whom is a minister of the Gospel.
