## Memoirs

### PETER BURROWS.

The Rev. Peter Burrows, son of the late Francis and Esther Burrows, was born December 13, 1817, in Dorchester county, Md. Here he was reared, and married at the age of 22 to Miss Hester A. Mitchell. Of this mion there were born ten children, three of whom are now living. They were permitted to have the companionship of each other for about 19 rears, when God claimed her for His own. On the 27th of October, he again chose for himself a helpmeet in the person of Mrs. Delia Thompson. Of this marriage there are now living three daughters.

Having felt the divine call to the holy ministry, Peter Burrows laid aside monetary emoluments and followed the Heavenly Master to become a fisher of men." He connected himself with the Delaware Annual Con-ternice at Wilmington, Del., in 1865, and remained in the effective work and 1893. For 28 years he blew the trumpet as a trusty watchman, giving an uncertain sound, rousing the wicked with the judgment's dread alarm, diging the believer until the Christ became his "all and in all." During these years he served his church honestly, courageously and well at Easton Wilmington, Del., Salem, N. J., Milford, Del., Harrington, Del., Camden, N. J., Marion, Md., Pomona, Salem, Md., and Hurlock, four sears Presiding Elder.

While in Camden, N. J., he lost by death his loving wife, who went to be with Jesus. He married for the third time in February, 1882, Mrs. Harriet Johnson, who now survives him.

Having superannuated in 1893, he retired to his home near Airey's, and where he lived until his death. His last illness began January 2, 1901, and he lingered until February 22, 1901, when he heard the voice of Jesus awng, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for He left this earthly house and went to dwell with his Lord, in the test prepared for the people of God. To the home of the blest he has gone there to await his brothers and to greet those whom he "has loved pand lost, long since awhile."
