PROCEEDINGS

On motion Brother Meese was referred to Committee on Elders' Orders.

G. F. Wiltse, Committee on Memoirs, made a report. Adopted.

Remarks by Brother Wiltse on the life of Brother Cain—our own fallen hero in Africa.

Brother Cook led in the song "Oh, think of the home over there."

The second name mentioned in report of Committee on Memoirs, Rev. Edmund E. Clow, one of the pioneer workers in Minnesota, who, together with Brother Fulkerson and Brother Haney who still live, gave the best years of his ministry to the work in Minnesota, passed away in early spring. Our fathers were single minded and determined, and we may well pause to pay this tribute to their memory. God bless them and help us to bring forward the same spirit and with new determination seek to carry our cause forward.

Rev. J. W. Fulkerson tendered his resignation as Preachers' Aid Treasurer. Accepted, and E. E. Todd elected to fill the vacancy.

Report of Committee on the Christian Home was given by Brother Varce, who read an excellent paper. Motion to adopt was carried.

N. S. Hankins made report on Bible cause. Discussion by Brother Fulkerson, who gave an excellent talk containing some very interesting facts about the Bible.

By common consent the time of final adjournment was fixed for the close of the Sunday evening service.

Edith M. Gates, Committee on Education, made report, after which President Bookwalter addressed the Conference in the interest of education and Western College, and received several donations.

Discussion by Brothers Meese, Vine, and Morgan. Report on education adopted.

On motion W. Haney, of Marion, was reëlected trustee of Western College.

The report of Cordova, which had been deferred, as an accommodation to the pastor, was now reported by the pastor, O. D. Koontz. Name passed.

Moved by W. F. Herman—

1. That we publish five hundred copies of the Conference Minutes, and that the work be done by our own Publishing House.

2. That the Conference chart be inserted.

3. That the Conference Secretary be instructed to prepare the Minutes for publication.

4. That W. W. Vine be instructed to secure the funds to pay for publication of same.

The motion was adopted.

On motion N. S. Hankins was elected corresponding member of Union Biblical Seminary,

On motion H. Deal was elected corresponding member of United Brethren Historical Society.

E. J. Reed, Missionary Treasurer, made report. Report adopted and Brother Reed reëlected.

On motion W. F. Herman was elected Missionary Secretary.

Rev. U. A. Cook presented the matter of indebtedness on Wykoff church, after which Brother Reed presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That we donate to Wykoff church all the claim of our Preachers' Aid Fund treasury against said church, provided that all other claims are paid in full.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

Moved by E. J. Reed that it is the request of this Annual Conference that the Church-Erection Society donate one-half their claim on Wykoff church, providing the people of Wykoff will pay the other half. Motion adopted.

On motion, Brother Varce was elected to correspond with the Secretary at Dayton concerning the matter.

Motion to divide the paper, vote on the first five and then the last. Motion carried.

On motion, the first five were adopted.

Moved and seconded to adopt the last resolution. Motion carried. (See report.)

Conference voted to hold the next Annual Conference at Pleasant Prairie.

After the announcements Brother W. W. Vine pronounced the benediction, and Conference adjourned until 7:30 P.M.

EVENING SESSION.

At 7:30 a memorial service was held in memory of our martyred missionaries. This service was led by Rev. Delia Todd, of Eyota. The speakers of the evening were U. A. Cook, President Bookwalter, Rev. C. Whitney, of Dayton, and Bishop N. Castle.

Sister Amy Graves, of Spring Valley, read the Scripture lesson, and Mrs. Van Blaricon, of Cordova, offered the opening prayer.

After the closing song, "We'll never say good-bye in heaven," President Bookwalter closed the service with prayer, in which he spoke tenderly of Father Clow, who died during the Conference year.

At the close of the memorial service Bishop Castle called the Conference to order, and the Woman's Missionary Association was granted a few moments in which to hear reports and elect officers.

Reading of the minutes of the day by the secretary. Adopted after corrections.

Announcements for Sunday. Singing and benediction. Adjournment.

SUNDAY SERVICES.

At 10 o'clock Rev. C. Whitney, of Dayton, took charge of the Conference love-feast and gave utterance to some

very earnest words found in Isaiah 52:11. "Be ye clean, that bear the vessels of the Lord." At the close of the love-feast Bishop Castle read the Scripture lesson from Joshua 4, after which President Bookwalter offered prayer. After singing, the Bishop preached from these words: "What mean ye by these stones?" Joshua 4:6.

At the close of the sermon, Rev. Ira E. Meese, who in Saturday's session had been referred to Committee on Elders' Orders, was set apart to the office of an elder by the laying on of hands, the newly elected presiding elders assisting the Bishop in the ceremony.

Following the ordination service an offering was taken which amounted in cash and subscriptions to \$250.

Before the closing song the Bishop read the report of the Stationing Committee. (See report.)

The morning service closed with song and the benediction. At 3 o'clock Rev. W. W. Vine had charge of the Sabbath-school anniversary, for which a program had been prepared.

At the close of this service the Bishop read the appointment of standing committees.

At 7:30 Rev. W. W. Vine conducted a song service, after which Rev. J. W. Fulkerson preached the closing sermon from the words found in Heb. 12:28, 29, "Wherefore, receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us have grace, whereby we may offer service well-pleasing to God with reverence and awe: for our God is a consuming fire.'

At the closing of the sermon the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered, Rev. George Harding conducting this service. After all who desired had communed, Brother Harding gave an earnest exhortation to unbelievers, and one arose for prayers.

All joined in singing "God be with you till we meet again," after which Brother Fulkerson pronounced the final benediction.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Success in any calling calls for preparation, and he who without such preparation takes up the work which God has been pleased to give him, however good his talents, or great his diligence, is, as one has said, "galloping upon a steed harnessed with a broken buckle, or like a messenger to a far country who forgets his message and must not marvel if he is left ingloriously in the dust." There is no work so great or important as that of the Christian minister, and if success in other callings demands thorough preparation should not the workman who deals, not with the material interests of men, but their immortal souls, be as thoroughly prepared? God calls men to study to show themselves approved unto God. We look upon the baptism of the Holy Ghost as the essential qualification, but we must seek as earnestly for thorough development of the mind.

Some one has said that "the divine call to the ministry implies, in addition to the one called being a Christian, the two-fold individual requirement, a passion for souls and a genius for moral ideas." True, and we, as a Church, owe it to the world to give special attention to building up our institutions of learning de-

voted to ministerial training. And if we, as God's messengers, covet a fruitful ministry, these institutions must command our respect. Souls are calling not for unequipped workers but for teachers and preachers "throughly furnished unto all good works." And when we, as ministers, have secured the preparation which we do need, the Church will gladly send us forth clothed with its own authority to preach "the unsearchable riches of Christ."

. . . The fields are white already unto harvest, and God is calling for workmen, but the call is for equipped not unequipped laborers—skillful workmen "rightly dividing the word of truth." We must rally around our institutions of learning, support them, endow them with money.

The writer voices the sentiments of the Conference in saying: We appreciate the presence of President Bookwalter, of Western College, and will hear gladly whatever message he may bring. We pledge to him our prayers, support, and cooperation and will let nothing short of honest, earnest, work in behalf of Western College satisfy us. Let each minister say, I will not cease trying until my field is represented in the college. There is nothing which has so widely, deeply, or earnestly, engaged the human mind as the "doctrine relating to God and divine things." The minister of God needs to know of them. We are called to "Preach the Word"—nothing but the Word of God—therefore we would testify to our loyalty to Union Biblical Seminary and gladly greet its representative. Believing that college and Seminary together develop the head, the heart, and the life and make ready the individual for the reception of power, we pray God that he will direct the steps of those he calls from the United Brethren Church to be his ministers, to go by way of these institutions into active service, as workmen "that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

In conclusion we heartily endorse the economic financial management of Western College and shall continue to make every effort to collect our college apportionment in full. We shall join freely with the Church of the cooperating territory in the present strong effort to liquidate the debt, and will welcome the representatives of the college among us. We will do our part in practically hastening the day when our college shall be free from debt.
