DEWITT C. CHALLIS

DeWitt C. Challis joined the Detroit Conference in 1874 and spent sixteen years of his ministry as a missionary in Bulgaria.

He was born at Chazy, N. Y., April 20, 1845, and died February 14, 1939, at the home of his daughter, Miss Bertha Challis, in Altadena, Calif., aged 93 years, 9 months and 24 days. He had been in fairly good health until a short time before his death, although he had been blind for a number of years.

He was a graduate of the University of Michigan, joining the Detroit Conference in 1874, and after one year at Wild Fowl and Fair Haven, went to Bulgaria, where he built his monument in a great school, for which he chose the site and which he founded in the city of Lovetch; in 1933 a memorial was sent to D. C. Challis from Bulgaria, which said: "The members of the Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Bulgaria send to their spiritual father and teacher, DeWitt C. Challis, their hearty, brotherly greetings and wishes for a blessed and peaceful old age."

More recently the school completed and dedicated a new building to his memory — "Challis Hall."

His first wife died in Bulgaria, leaving a little son, who is now Dr. Edward I. Challis of Seattle, Wash. The children of his second wife, who now survive him are: Miss Bertha Challis, of Altadena, Calif., and Mrs. J. H. Bretz, of Chicago, Ill.

The funeral was conducted by Dudley Snudden, assistant pastor of the First Methodist Church, Pasadena.
