Ruford B. Cook

The Rev. Ruford B. Cook was born in Watertown, N. Y., February 21, 1877. He graduated from Cazenovia Seminary in 1902, and from Syracuse University in 1906. He was long a devoted alumnus of the University and served on its board of trustees for a number of years. During the years 1934 and 1935 he took graduate work in philosophy at Syracuse under the late Dr. Wilson.

He was received on trial in the Central New York Conference in 1903 and in full membership in 1906. He was ordained a Deacon in 1906 and an Elder in 1908. After serving charges in that conference he transferred into the Troy



charges in that conference he transferred into the Troy Conference in 1919 as superintendent of Italian work in Conference in 1919 as superintendent of Italian work in Albany and Schenectady. In 1925 he was appointed pastor of our church in Dannemora and was the Chaplain at the hospital there. Other pastorates were Schuylerville, Fort Plain, Nassau, Associate at Trinity Albany and for the last ten years of his active ministry at Hudson Falls. After his retirement he moved to Clockville to the home of his wife And in 1951 accepted an appointment as pastor.

He died after a brief illness in the Central New York Conference. He died after a brief illness in the Oneida Hospital on Friday, March 12, 1954. R. B., as he was affectionately known by his friends, was married three times. His first wife, Ada Eastman, died a few years after marriage. He married May Niles and it was she whom we knew during his ministry in the Troy Conference. Mrs. Cook died in Hudson Falls April 8, 1947 while R. B. was pastor there. He later married Helen Merring, a life long friend and the widow of a former District Superintendent of the Central New York Conference. She died in Syracuse April 5, 1951

It can well be said that R. B. was a good minister of Jesus Christ. He put his whole heart into his work wherever he lived and whatever he was doing. The churches he served will long remember his enthusiasm and loyalty. Even in retirement he continued his very active ministry. His last charge of three churches increased in the whole program of work during his ministry. His activity was that of a much younger man than his years. In his study he kept abrenst of all thinking and scholarship of the present day. He was "right up to the minute" in what was going on in the world. While at Hudson Falls he introduced the unit system of finance and laid the plans which are now being carried out in the educational program of the church.

For many years he was a member of the Board of Ministerial Training of the conference. While Registrar he planned and put into operation the present method of presenting the report of that Board to the conference. This is now being used by conferences throughout the church. Many of our present members well remember meeting the Registrar when they applied for entrance into our conference. His geniality and friendliness made them feel immediately at home. His interests included many things outside his pastoral work. We all remember his love for dogs and the many fine breeds that he raised. He entered into sports with the same vigor and interest. His many friends bear witness to his loyalty and faithfulness. He had a keen sense of humor and many times would relieve a tense situation with just the right word or story.
