Greensboro Circuit, 1842; Hancock Mission. 1846-8: Waynesboro Circuit, 1849-50: Sandersville Circuit, 1851; Troup Circuit, 1852; Fort Valley Circuit, 1853-5; Zebulon Circuit, 1856; Hancock Colored Mission, 1857; Burke Colored Mission, 1859-60; Morgan Colored Mission, 1861-3; Sylvania Circuit, 1864-5; Bethel and Colored Charge, 1866; Greenville and Chalybeate Springs, 1875-6; Kings Gap and County Line, 1877-80; since then, superannuated. These dates mark the stages of a long, active, useful, honored life, which closed after months of great suffering, but without a shadow between the saintly spirit of our brother and the Lord he had served so well.

HENRY CRANFORD was born in Montgomery County, N. C., February 3, 1802; and died at his home, in Jackson County, Ga., August 19, 1887. He was converted and joined the Church September 29, 1826. He was married to Miss Louisa Gathright October 30, 1825. He served the Church as an exhorter for a number of years, and was licensed to preach November 16, 1839. He was admitted on trial into the Georgia Conference in 1846, and served, among others, the following works: Clayton Mission, 1846; Murphy Mission, 1847; Carnesville Circuit, 1848; Monroe Circuit, 1849; Carnesville Circuit, 1859; Kingston Mission, 1851; Athens Factory Mission, 1852; Kingston Colored Mission, 1853; Broad River Colored Mission, 1854-5; Walkinsville Mission, 1857; Morgan Colored Mission, 1859; Athens Colored Mission, 1860; Athens Factory Mission. 1861-2; Monroe Circuit, 1863; Decatur Circuit, 1864; Lexington and Colored Mission, 1865; Carnesville Circuit, 1866; Clayton Mission, 1867; since then, superannuated. A man of great simplicity of character, earnest, and faithful, God gave him many seals to his ministry.

F. M. T. Brannon was born in Newton County, Ga., March 3, 1827; was married to Miss II. L. Westwood September 17, 1830; and died at Fairburn, Ga., September 2, 1887. IIe was converted and joined the Church when eleven years old, and was a class-leader when only fourteen. He was licensed to preach in 1863, and preached locally eleven years. He was admitted on trial into the North Georgia Conference in 1874. The following is a list of his appointments: Hogansville Circuit, 1875-6; Grantville, 1877; Whitesville, 1878-80; Houston, 1881-3; supernumerary in 1884; Superintendent of Orphaus' Home, 1886; Fairburn Circuit, 1887. Brother Brannon was a useful man, and God honored his ministry with the conversion of many souls.

WILLIAM MUNROE CRUMLEY was born at Laurens C. H., S. C., February 29, 1816; and died at Atlanta, Ga., April 24, 1887. At the early age of eighteen he married Miss Sarah McLain, after whose death he married, in 1849, Miss Julia A. Choate. He was admitted on trial into the North Georgia Conference in 1840, and

spent the first two years of his itinerant life at Madison, Fla. His next work was missionary Madison, Fla. His next work was missionary to the negroes on the rice-plantations near St. and he next served the white people of that town. His next work was in Elbert Consty, and then on the Green Circuit, where his labors were blessed with more than eight hum and missions of the Conference? dred conversions. After this his appointments were: Mulberry Street, Macon, 1846-7; Albens, 1848; Vineville, 1849; Lumpkin, 1856; Columbus, 1851-2; Savannah, 1853-5, a paster ate made memorable by his heroism during a yellow fever scourge; St. James, Augusta, 1856-7; Rome, 1858-9; Trinity, Atlanta, 1860; Mad ison, 1861; Chaplain to the Georgia Hospital in Richmond, Va., and in the field, 1862-4; St. James, later part of 1865; First Street, Macon 1866; Trinity, Atlanta, 1867-70; La Grange 1871-2; Rome, 1873-5; Edgewood, 1876; the superannuated. A strangely-eloquent, sweet-spirited, Christ-like man! The activity and heroism of his earlier life had a wonderful his perfect complement in the patient, trustful years in which he waited the coming of his Lord.

JAMES G. WORLEY was born in Cherokee County, Ga., about the year 1822; and died No. vember 9, 1887, after a ten-days' illness. The facts of Brother Worley's life accessible to are meager and scattered. He was admitted at trial into the Georgia Conference in 1852. He was appointed to the Carrollton Circuit in 1858 Carnesville Circuit, 1854; Marphy Mission 1855; Seriven Colored Mission, 1856; Waynesboro Circuit, 1858; Glasscock Mission, 1859 Homer Circuit, 1871; Hall Circuit, 1872; Buchanan Circuit, 1874; Sawnee Circuit, 1886 Logansville Circuit, 1881; Fayetteville Circuit 1883. The gaps in this record are largely explained by the frequency with which Brother Worley was transferred to other Conference and the persistency with which he returned to his first love. At the various times he served charges in the Conferences of Louisiana, Call fornia, Texas, and Florida. He was a mane peculiar temperament, active to the point restlessness, intense in his convictions, fearless in the advocacy of his views, and consecrated in the spirit of his life.

WILTON P. QUILLIAN was born July 5, 1862 and died at Rutledge, Ga., Nov. 1, 1887, below his admission into full membership in the Conference. He joined the Church in 1874, and was licensed to preach in 1893; was admitted trial into the North Georgia Conference in 1884.
