
Conference Resolution.

Curtiss put out on the eternal sea, and answered the summons, "Child of Mine, come Home." His soul was transferred to the eternal; the mortal had taken on immortality. Sharing that definite promise, "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

Brother Curtiss was born in Nichols, Conn., October 26, 1851. His spiritual birth took place in 1872 at the Washington Park Church in Bridgeport, Conn. He entered the Christian ministry and became a
