Northwestern College forged ahead into the front ranks as an educational institution. In 1910 he resigned his position as president of the college and entered the pastorate in the Illinois Conference, having transferred his membership from the Wisconsin Conference in 1893. Ninetien years he served in the pastorate. He was elected as presiding elder to the Peoria and Freeport-Chicago Districts; was delegate to the General Conference times. In 1929 he retired from active ministerial service and moved to Pasadena, Calif. A long, useful and eventful life ended with his passing.

Rev. J. H. Johnson was born in Thunum, East Frieslan, Germany, January 29, 1857, and died in his home in Ashton, Illinois, July 20, 1936. He came to America with his parents when 11 years old. The family settled in St. Louis. The next year they came to Peoria, Illinois, where he joined the Lutheran Church. January 1876, he was happily converted. He united with the Evangelical Church in studies at Northwestern College and Union Biblical Institute at Naperville and served on various charges in the Illinois Conference 41 years, retiring in 1923. Rev. Edwin Yeakel was born in Berks County, Pa., September 21, 1857, and died in the Deaconess Hospital, Freeport, Illinois, February 2, 1937. He came to Illinois with his parents at the age of 14, to Polo, Illinois. Graduated with the Class of 1877 from the Polo Community High School. In 1878 he entered North-Pennsylvania and united with the Evangelical Church. Licensed to preach by years, 37 of these in the pastorate and 16 years as presiding elder. A man of deep religious convictions and a forceful pulpit orator has fallen asleep in Jesus.

Rev. George Iwig was born in Tazewell County, Illinois, Feb. 5, 1862, and died in Princeton, Illinois, July 15, 1936. He was converted as a youth and united with the Evangelical Church, of which he continued a life long member. He was licensed by the Illinois Conference and served as a local preacher faithfully to the end.

Rev. William Gross, a superannuate of the Illinois Conference, was born in 1846, and died in his home in Urbana, Illinois, April 6, 1937, aged 91 years. He was licensed by the Illinois Conference to preach the Gospel in 1876. His first charge was South Chicago and Englewood. He served in various pastorates for 44 years.

William Schuster was born in Germany in the year 1849. He was licensed in the Illinois Conference in 1875. He died in Montana in the summer of 1936.
