BISHOP J. J. ESHER.

WHEREAS, It has pleased God in whose power are life and death, to remove from the church militant to the church triumphant, by the hand of death our beloved and venerable Bishop, John J. Esher, the senior Bishop of our Evangelical Association, and

WHEREAS, Our sainted Bishop gave his life to the church in consecrated service, whereby, especially in the Episcopal of-fice, his noble character, his great talents, the intense energy of his great intellect and his superior wisdom shone forth in unsullied lustre, for nearly 40 years, leav-· ing their indelible impress upon the temporal and spiritual economy of our -church, therefore

Resolved, That we as the East Pennsylvania Conference, of Evangelical As-- sociation, do now solemnly record our sincere and heartfelt sorrow over the great loss we, in common, with our entire church, have sustained in the death of

Bishop John J. Esher, further Resolved, That we give thanks to God for having given our church this prince of preachers and leader among men, and for having sustained him for so many years of eminent service by voice and pen and administrative counsel. His keen inteligence, his broad grasp of great questions and far-reaching policies, his masterful will, his deep piety, his profound knowledge of the Word of God, his many personal virtues, and his official conscientiousness and fidelity fitted him in an extraordinary degree for the office of a Bishop, and were a priceless blessing to the church. His wise counsels as chairman of this conference and his masterly sermons in this conference district remain a blessed memory to both ministry and laity, and a beacon light to guide us onward. To the bereaved family of the departed Bishop we extend our sincere condolence and heartfelt sympathy, and we pray that the God of all grace may comfort them and us with the plentitude of divine consolation in this great bereave-

REV. HENRY BONTZ.

Rev. Henry Bontz, departed this life Oct. 29, 1901, in his 69th year. He was converted in 1858 and at once joined our church. He was faithful, loyal, and true to the church of his choice. He was licensed to preach in 1893 and served the church very acceptably in a local capacity. His advice in the administrative affairs of the church was eagerly sought for and usually sound. It is due to his memory to say that this beautiful edifice, in which this conference is assembled, stands as a monument of his love for and his liberality to the cause of Christ. We regret that he was not permitted to meet with us, which would have been his delight. We also honor his memory by recording the fact that he made provision for the entertainment of four preachers during this session.

BRO. LEVI WENTZ.

Levi Wentz was born Jan. 24, 1824, and died Sept. 13, 1901. He was converted in 1845 under the labors of the Sainted Rev. Henry Fisher. He served as class leader and exhorter for 52 years. He also served as associate judge of Carbon County for 8 years. In 1852 he was licensed to preach the Gospel. After serving acceptably for a number of

years as a local preacher, he returned his license, on account of a throat affection. which incapacitated him from serving further in this capacity. Bro. Wentz was known throughout our church as a man of God, faithful in the performance of his duties and loval to our beloved church.

REV. JESSE HUNSBERGER.

Rev. Jesse Hunsberger was converted when he was a young man, on Milford Circuit, and also licensed on the same circuit. He soon felt called to the ministry: the church recognizing the call, sent him out as a local preacher in which capacity he labored faithfully 40 years. He was a pious, quiet, consistent man, preaching by precept and example. He was in later years a member of our 9th street church, in Reading. In his last hours he frequently sang, "Oh, the way is so delightful, in the service of the Lord."

We would recommend that a memorial service be held this (Monday) afternoon in connection with the opening devotional exercises, and that our Bishops be requested to speak briefly on the lives and labors of these departed servants of God.



Proceedings of the Forty-Ninth Annual Session OF THE

Indiana Conference of the Evan, Association,

Thursday Morning Session.

The members of the Indiana Conference of the Evangelical Association convened April 11, 1901, at 9, a.m., in Trinity church of the Evangelical Association of Berne, Adams Co., Indiana.

Promptly at 9 a. m. Bishop Thomas Bowman, of Chicago, Ills., called the Conference to order and opened the same by reading from the word of God II. Timothy the 2nd chapter. The Conference then joined in singing from the Church Hymnal No. 32: 'Come Thou, Almighty King,' after which Conference was led in earnest prayer by the Bishop. The blessing of the Lord was invoked upon the Conference as well as bringing thanksgiving unto Him for His great help!and

blessings bestowed upon His servants during the Conference year.

'O worship the Lord in the beauty of Holiness' was then sung and William Yost once more led in prayer.

After singing, 'He Leadeth me,' the organization of the Conference was completed by the chairman again appointing J. H. Evans secretary, who then appointed Thomas Finkbeiner as English assistant and reporter to the Evangelical Messenger and L. J. Ehrhardt as German assistant and reporter to the Christliche Botschafter.

The Bishop then read from the discipline the rules that govern the Conference session. In his opening address the Bishop stated that Bishop Esher, who was to preside over this Conference or the Conference of th

ence, was not able to preside by reason of sickness and that he was requested by Bishop Esher to preside in his stead. He also requested Bishop Bowman to kindly remember him to the brethren of the Indiana Conference. He greets them as a fellow servant of the Lord Jesus. He wishes them a blessed session, the grace of God, and finally an abundant entrance into His kingdom.

Among other things the Bishop pointed out in his address that a preacher of the Gospel must be a man of God, sound in theory and practice, not every man that can make a public address is a preacher. If we want to save men and lead them to Jesus Christ, we must in a measure draw them first to ourselves. The man of God filled with the Holy Ghost will be successful in winning souls to God. Our people want good warm sermons coming from the heart. Be therefore men walking daily in the fear of God. The business of the Conference was then taken up.

- 1. Roll was called.
- 2. William Yost, missionary treasurer, and H. Mattill, junior publishing agent, both of Cleveland, Ohio, were received as advisory members of this Conference.
- 3. The Conference Missionary treasurer was authorized to pay the missionaries at present 90 per cent. of their missionary appropriations, hoping however that he may be able to pay out in full before the Conference closes.

4. The business rules were suspended in order to give H. Mattill the privilege to address Conference. 5. H. Mattill addressed Conference in the interest of any Publishing House.

- 5. H. Mattill addressed Conference in the interest of our Publishing House. The address was referred to the committee on resolutions.
- 6. In as much as Dr. Pearson, agent of the American Bible Society, desired to attend our Conference, he however arriving one day too early, and feeling himself necessitated to leave as soon as possible, by consent he was granted permission to make his address before the Conference Missionary Society. The subject matter of it being promised to be properly brought before the Conference, therefore, Resolved, that the same be now and is hereby referred to the committee on resolutions.
- 7. The business rules of the Conference were read and adopted.
- 8. The time for the daily sessions was fixed from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and from 1:30 to 5 p. m.
- 9. J. H. Breish was appointed as reporter to the Daily Witness.
- 10. The examination of the moral and official conduct of the members was then taken up and ended without charges.
- 11. C. D. Rarey, by his own request had credentials granted him to unite with the Illinois Conference.
- 12. W. Leader had credentials granted him.
- 13. Conference adjourned with prayer by J. Kaufman.

Thursday Afternoon Session.

The Bishop again occupied the chair. After roll-call he read a part of the 2nd chapter of Paul's letter to the Philippians.

The secretary then read the first directions of the Discipline. Conference joined in worship by singing 'I need Thee every hour;' prayer by J. M. Haug; song, 'Blessed Assurance.'

1. Committee on worship reported that Rev. William Yost, of Cleveland, O., will preach this evening and Rev. G. Johnson, of Naperville, Ills., will

preach to-morrow evening. The report was adopted.

- 2. The first four pews were fixed as the Conference bar.
- 3. Resolved, that Saturday evening shall be devoted to a Y. P. A. rally and that the Conference Branch Officers with the committee on worship arrange the program.
- 4. It was reported to conference that sister J. M. Haug had died during the year; referred to the committee on memorials.
