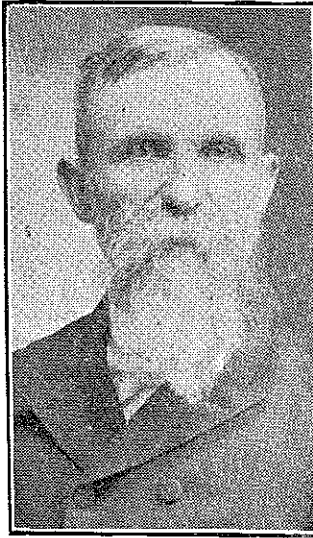

REV. T. R. FAULKNER.

The Rev. T. R. Faulkner, a superannuated minister of the West Virginia Conference, was born in Greenup county, Ky., January 9, 1844, and died at his home in Albright, W. Va., August 30, 1923.

In early life he lived with his mother at Ironton, Ohio, and attended school there. As the father had died before the son was born, the latter depended on his mother for his early care and training, and it seems that she did her part well. Later in life he attended school at Mount Union College. During the war between the States he served for almost four years in the Union Army.



Soon after the close of the war, he began to study for the ministry and was received into the West Virginia Conference in 1871. He served the following charges: Brandonville, Morgantown Circuit, Rowlesburg, Williamstown, St. Mary's, Hartford City, New Martinsville, Letart, Nicholas Circuit, Medaryville (Indiana), Albright, Aurora, Grantsville, Bruce-ton and Freemansburg.

On April 29, 1875, he was married to Miss Martha V. Bishop. Three children have blessed the home.

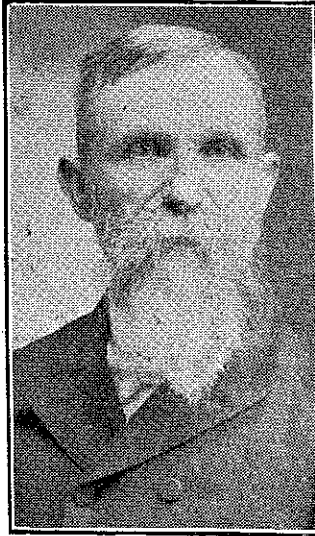
