

could not appreciate the awful tension of the inner conflict and contest which he faced during these later years. This struggle was all the more severe because of his naturally sensitive and poetic nature.

Funeral services were conducted in Libertyville, July 13, the Rev. Aubrey Moore presiding. A very representative body of Rock River ministers joined with the stricken family and the sorrowing congregation in this service of love and memory. In addition to the addresses made by a layman and a local pastor, Horace G. Smith spoke and J. B. Martin offered prayer. Interment was at Charter Grove, Ill.

#### WILLIAM A. FRYE

The Rev. William Frye, 966 Sheridan Avenue, Ypsilanti, Mich., a retired Methodist minister, died at his home Wednesday afternoon, November 8. Dr. Frye had been ill about a month, first stricken while he was visiting friends in Illinois. Coming to his home he failed to recover and death closed a remarkable life.

He was born in Nobel County, O., in 1858, and after graduating from Scio College, Ohio, married Clarabelle Buckley, November 6, 1884. In the fall of that year he entered the ministry, receiving his first regular appointment at Ashland, a small village north of Grand Rapids.

He was a member of the Michigan Methodist Conference for twenty years. serving in many of the larger cities throughout the state.

While pastor in Grand Rapids he was a prominent figure in one of the big strikes, espousing the cause of the men.

Kalamazoo was perhaps his most successful pastorate but his strong personality was felt wherever he worked.

Dr. Frye was transferred to the East where he remained for a period of seven years. While he was the pastor of the First Methodist Church at East Orange, N. J., Mrs. Thomas Edison worshiped there and occasionally Mr. Edison attended his church.

Dr. Frye came later to the Rock River Conference. It was while he was connected with this Conference that he held the position of chaplain of the state prison at Joliet, Ill.

Three years ago Dr. Frye retired from active ministry in the church, having served for forty-nine years. He and his wife went to Ypsilanti and had made their home there since.

Besides his widow he is survived by two sons, Warren J. of Detroit, and James A. of San Francisco. A sister, Mrs. Lina Fishel of Ohio, and a brother, Marion of New York, also survive.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church, Saturday, November 11, with Rev. Marshall Reed in charge and Rev. Frank L. Fitch and other ministers assisting in the service. Burial was in Elmwood Cemetery, Detroit.

#### ERNEST WRAY ONEAL

Ernest Wray Oneal was born of pioneer Methodist parents in Glenwood, Ia., August 29, 1863; converted at a revival meeting held by his father when Ernest was sixteen years old; educated at Simpson College, Indianola, Ia., and Garrett Biblical Institute; later honored with the citation from the Court of Honor of the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity; granted the honorary degree in divinity; entered the ministry in the Des Moines Conference in 1885 and appointed to the Villisca Circuit; transferred to the Rock River Conference and held successful pastorates at Ashton, Aurora, First Church, Chicago; Ottawa St. Joliet, then an interim pastorate at Minneapolis, then Olivet Church, Chicago, and First Church, Freeport. He retired in 1933 and served as supply at Lighthouse and Chana until his decease, March 16, 1934. Burial was at Oregon, Ill.

In 1887 he was united in marriage to Miss Grace Ellenwood of Newton, Kan., who preceded him in death in the year 1924. He later married Miss May
