While desceding the moutain road near Chambersburg, Pa., the brakes of his car gave way, the car was overturned, and he was thrown from the car and died very soon after. His wife and daughter were seriously but not fatally injured. They were unable to attend the funeral services which were held at Attica, Ohio, where he was serving as pastor of the church.
