GEORGE DIMMITT

George Frederick was born in Ottumwa, Iowa on October 13, 1908 to Frederick and Bertha (McCartney) Dimmitt. He was a graduate of Park College, Parkville, Missouri in 1932 and Garrett Bible Institute in 1942.

George married Ethel Dean Johnson on June 12, 1937 in Kankakee, Illinois. Three children were born to this union; Donald Neil, Judith L. and Georgia Dean. Before entering the ministry George owned and operated a weekly newspaper in Allerton, Iowa. From 1942 to 1956, George served several South Iowa Methodist churches. At that time, he became the Superintendent of Wesley Acres Retirement Home in Des Moines and in 1966 the manager for the former South Iowa Methodist Homes.

George was very active in ministries related to the elderly and aging. He served as the first president of the Iowa Association of Homes for the Aging and was the recipient of their Pioneer Award. George retired in 1975 and moved to Mountain Home, Arkansas living there until 1991 when he moved to Aldersgate Village in Topeka, Kansas where he was residing at his death.

George Frederick died December 25, 1996 at the age of 88 due to kidney complications. His memorial service was held on December 28 at Wesley Hall, Aldersgate Village, Topeka, Kansas with the Rev. Jerry Quiring officiating. Burial is in Ottumwa, Iowa. George was preceded in death by his daughter, Georgia Dean who died in infancy. Survivors include: his wife, Dean of Topeka, Kansas; his son, Donald of Lawrence, Kansas; his daughter, Judith Moul of Mason City, Iowa; and two grandchildren.

BROWN GARLOCK

Brown Garlock, the son of Roy and Ethel (Brown) Garlock, was born November 21, 1920 at Harris, Iowa. He was a graduate of South Sioux City, Nebraska High School in 1938. He later graduated from Morningside College of Sioux City, Iowa and Garrett Bible Institute, Evanston, Illinois. Brown was ordained in 1945 and began serving Methodist churches in Iowa.

On June 27, 1954 Brown married Amy Lou Miller at Ogden, lowa. Together they served churches in lowa until Brown's retirement in 1987. They moved to the lowa City area and Brown continued his ministry by serving at Viola-Martelle and as visitation pastor at lowa City First UMC. Brown was a member of Wapsinonoc Masonic Lodge, the Juanita Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, the Rotary Club, and the Lions Club.

Brown Garlock died on April 14, 1997 at age of 76 following a massive heart attack. His memorial services were April 18 at the West Branch United Methodist Church with the Rev. Richard Paulus officiating and April 19 at the Ogden United Methodist Church. Left to cherish Brown's memory are: his wife, Amy Lou of West Branch; two sons, David of Indianapolis, Indiana, and Dennis of Lebanon, Ohio; two daughters, Sheila Vorba of Hiawatha, Iowa and Lisa Knogable of Mount Union, Iowa; two sisters, Margaret McDonald of Longville, Minnesota and Adell Oberg of Estes Park, Colorado; four grandchildren and three step-grandsons. He was preceded in death by two brothers, a sister, and an infant son.

MAX GOLDMAN

Max Eugene Goldman and his twin sister, were born November 23, 1917 to Frank and Dovie (Cooksey) in Dugger, Indiana. He was a graduate of Indiana State University in 1941, Boston University in 1946 (Bachelor of Sacred Theology and Master of Divinity), and Dubuque Theological Seminary in 1983 (Doctor of Ministry). Max also served in the U.S. Navy during World War II.
