DAILY PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY-Wednesday, March 15, 1911

CONFERENCE CONVENED.—The Philadelphia Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in its one hundred and twenty-fourth session in the Park Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Philadelphia, at 9 a.m., Wednesday, March 15th, 1911, Bishop Charles W. Smith presiding.

OPENING SERVICES.—The hymn beginning, "And are we yet alive?" was announced and sung. At the request of Bishop Smith, prayer was offered by S. W. Thomas, and the Scripture lesson read by John F. Crouch.

THE LORD'S SUPPER ADMINISTERED.—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then administered by Bishop Smith, assisted by the five District Superintendents and Linn Bowman, the pastor of the church.

ROLL CALL.—At the request of Bishop Smith, the secretary of the last Conference, S. G. Grove, called the roll of the Conference, and 252 members answered to their names.

MEMBERS DETAINED.—The following were reported as unavoidably detained: S. H. C. Smith, Joseph H. Smith, J. B. Mackay, George S. Kerr, James P. Shook.

ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE.—The organization of the Conference was then effected as follows: S. G. Grove was unanimously elected secretary by acclamation, on motion of S. W. Thomas, with permission to nominate his assistants. He nominated B. T. Callen, Robert C. Wells, and Henry Frankland as his assistants; F. E. Graeff as biographical secretary, and J. W. Sayers as railroad secretary.

On motion of W. L. McDowell, Maris Graves was elected statistician, with the privilege of nominating his assistants. He nominated F. E. Graeff and Henry Hess.

On motion of S. W. Thomas, T. Kirkpatrick was elected conference treasurer, to continue in office until the next session of the Conference, with the privilege of nominating his assistants. He nominated J. W. Harkins and E. W. Rushton as his assistants, and J. S. Hughes as treasurer of the Conference Claimants Fund.

CHORISTER ELECTED.—On motion of J. T. Satchell, Cornelius Hudson was elected chorister.

NOMINATIONS CONFIRMED.—The nominations were confirmed.

ALLOWED TO BE RECORDED.—On motion of J. W. Sayers, members of the Conference absent at roll call were permitted to have their presence recorded on application to the secretary.

RULES ADOPTED.—On motion of W. B. Wood, the rules governing the last Conference were adopted for the government of the present session.

CHANGES ALLOWED IN STANDING COMMITTEES.—E. C. Griffiths, on behalf of the District Superintendents, presented list of changes made in the Standing Committees. The changes were approved. (See list.)

Green and by her pastor, the writer, who had charge of the services. The remains were then taken to Westminster Cemetery for interment.

MRS. LILLIE B. GRAULEY.

Lillie B. Grauley, daughter of Jno. F. and Henrietta Galbraith, was born at Bainbridge, Penna., January 12th, 1862.

When sixteen years of age she was happily converted, and was received during the same year into the Methodist Episcopal Church. She came to Philadelphia in 1882, transferring her church membership to the Twentieth Street Church.

Sister Grauley was possessed of a studious mind, which led her to prepare for the profession of teacher in the public schools, at the same time pursuing an advanced course in the study of music.

In the year 1885 she was united in marriage to the Rev. J. Edwin Grauley, a member of the Philadelphia Annual Conference, the Rev. Enoch Stubbs performing the ceremony. Four children blessed this union, two of whom have preceded the mother to the heavenly homeland. A son and daughter remain to grieve with their father over their mother's departure.

Sister Grauley was an affectionate wife, a loving mother, a reliable friend, a genial companion and a devout Christian. It was in the home where her beautiful life was seen at its best, and it was there where all her friends came to admire and love her.

For several years she had been hattling against a tendency to mental and bodily infirmities, bearing up with marvelous fortitude for the sake of others. During the last three years of her life she gradually succumbed to the inroads of insidious disease and passed to her final rest and reward on December 10th, 1910, at Catasauqua, Pennsylvania.

During the months of great suffering our sister frequently expressed her perfect faith and trust in her Saviour, her last conscious words being two lines of the hymn:

> "Jesus, lover of my soul, Let me to Thy bosom fly."

Funeral services were held at the Catasauqua Church, nine ministers of seven different denominations participating, the Rev. C. A. Benjamin preaching the sermon. A large audience paid loving tribute to the departed.

Interment was made in the Riverside Cemetery at Norristown, Pa., District Superintendent Dr. G. H. Bickley, Rev. F. E. Graeff, Rev. A. A. Thompson and Rev. C. H. Rorer participating in the service.
