She was a loyal and energetic church worker being largely instrumental in the founding of our Methodist church at Lonsdale. She was an excellent Bible student and served as Sunday School Superintendent for a number of years. For a number of years she ran the only hotel in Lonsdale with a grocery store in connection. Fire destroyed all she possessed but she was still able on the following Sunday to request the Sunday School to sing the hymn, "God Will Take Care of You." She was a woman of strong faith, true character and fortitude. Her life was strewn with trials and burdens but she was able to bear them cheerfully and with gratitude for any helping hand offered her. She was buried in the Ten Mile Cemetery in the Lonsdale community.
