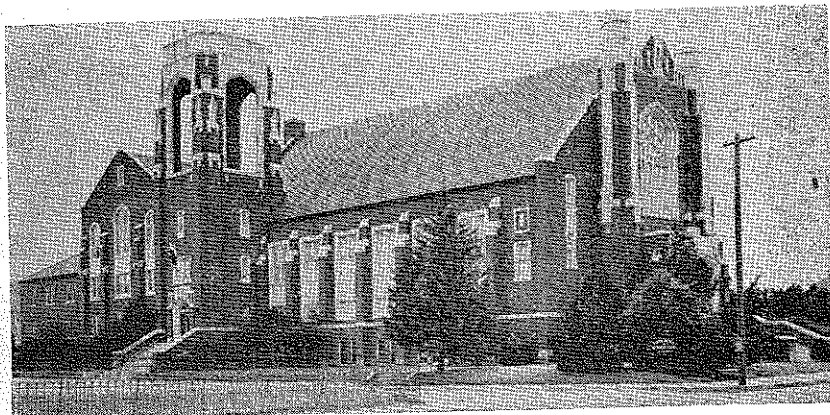

ANNIE CUNNINGHAM

Annie Cunningham was born December 2, 1876, in Chicago. Her school education was received in Boston from August 22, 1900, to Jennie Charlotte Stubbs. She worked on several railroads in Chicago, and developing as licensed to preach in old Wicker Park, Chicago. In 1904 he gave up a railroad position in Freedom, Wisconsin.

She was admitted on trial in the West Wisconsin Conference from two years longer at \$50 per month salary per year. In 1907 he was appointed to West Cross, Wisconsin, and received in full

He was pastor of the Babson Park Community Church, Pensacola, under the distinguished economist, Dr. Babson.

He was Pastor of Travis Park Methodist Church, Dallas, under Paul B. Kern, now Bishop Kern, the late pastor of the Central Texas Conference, and Dr. Carl C. Gregory. In 1932 he was appointed to the Texas Conference and transferred at the time of the Central Texas Conference.

His service in the Central Texas Conference in 1932 was followed by a series of delightful assignments. Then followed a series of delightful assignments: Meridian two years, Diamond Hill, Texas two years, Mt. Calm two years, and in 1937, Central Methodist Church, Fort Worth, as pastor. He held at the time of his death on April 10, 1937.

JEFFERSON DAVIS HENDRICKSON

The Rev. Jefferson Davis Hendrickson was born October 13, 1861 in Bell County, Texas. He married October 9, 1887. He joined the Central Texas Conference on trial in 1893 and was admitted into full membership in 1895. Having no children of their own he and his wife adopted a child and reared her with tender care in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. At the time of his death in Cisco, December 23, 1950, all of his immediate family had gone on before except one granddaughter, Mrs. Jeffie D. Northern, child of the adopted daughter, of San Antonio.

Brother Hendrickson retired from the active ministry in 1931 after some 33 years of service in the work of the Kingdom. He and his beloved wife moved into the home for retired ministers in Cisco, Texas where they soon established for themselves a place of genuine affection and high esteem in the hearts of all who knew them. After the death of his companion he continued to live among these Cisco people who during the years of his own declining health became ever more devoted to him and when he could no longer maintain his home they arranged for him to live in a family hotel, providing for special attentions to his needs. Their genuine love for him was itself indicative of the gentleness and beauty of his own Christian spirit. In his younger days he had been tall, broad-shouldered, erect and "every inch a man." When failing health came upon him his steps were slowed but he never lost the air of Christian dignity in his appearance. Great lover of music and of people, faithful servant of God, meticulous and earnest preacher of the gospel, Brother J. D. Hendrickson has gone to the Heavenly Home toward which every step of his Christian life had been directed. Funeral services were held in First Methodist Church in Cisco by the pastor Rev. E. H. Lightfoot, the district superintendent, the Rev. Leslie W. Seymour, the Rev. C. A. Warden and the Rev. Joe I. Patterson. Burial was by the side of his companion in the cemetery at Cisco. Brother Makowski was born May 21, 1868 in Danzig, Germany. Coming to Texas as an immigrant lad he found employment with a Methodist farm family near Seguin. In 1891 he was converted in the Bracken Methodist Church. Soon after he felt the call to preach, and entered the (then) Blinn Memorial College at Brenham for preparation.

He was admitted to the Southern Annual Conference in 1898. On Dec. 7, 1899 he was married to Miss Henrietta Wellman of Moody. She preceded him to the Father's house about 10 years ago. His youngest son, Erwin, was killed by a drunken driver soon after his wife's passing.

Surviving him are five sons and one daughter: Will H., of Riesel; Edwin, Walter, Hugo, Milton, and Mrs. H. L. Grusendorf, all of Waco.

His appointments were New Fountain, Houston, Victoria, Hilda, Blue Mound, Cook's Point, Lexington, Industry, Fashing, Moody, and Meier's Settlement. To the latter charge he was appointed in 1933 and served continuously until his end. He was retired in 1948 but continued to preach every Sunday until December 23, 1950, when the Lord called him to his reward. His age was 82 years.

Rev. Oran M. Stevens of Waco conducted the funeral services and Rev. H. M. Hopkins of Fort Worth preached the sermon.
