ELWOOD JENNINGS JONES

May 21, 1917 - June 19, 1984



Elwood Jennings Jones, the third son of William Henry and Lucinda Thacker Jones, was born in the Brown Summit community of Guilford County, North Carolina, on May 21, 1917. He attended the public schools of Guilford County. Upon graduation from James B. Dudley High School, he entered what was then A & T College, from which he earned the B.S. degree.

Brother Jones had a professional career in education, which he began as a teacher of history and English at Caswell High School in 1942. In 1945 he was elected principal of Randolph High School in Liberty, North Carolina. It was there that he met and married Elizabeth Scotton. They were married on November 22, 1950, and had a rich and meaningful life together for the next thirty-three and a half years. He was elected principal of Brown Summit High School in 1956

and served there until he retired in 1977.

Throughout his career as an educator, Elwood was never able to shake off the urge he felt to be a preacher, and he was licensed to preach in 1952. After earning a master's degree in administration, he enrolled in the Pastors' School at Bennett College. Through this channel he qualified for conference membership. He was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference (CJ) and ordained deacon in 1956 and was admitted to full connection and ordained elder in 1961.

Brother Jones served appointments in the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction at Mitchell, Wentworth-Bethel, St. Paul's, Kernersville, St. Peter's, Fletcher's Chapel, and Philadelphia. In the Western North Carolina Conference, he served the Empire Circuit (1973-77) and Addie's Chapel-Brooks' Chapel (1979). Ill health forced him to give up this, his last appointment, in 1979. He was on leave of absence until his passing. He received his final appointment from the great Bishop of us all on June 19, 1984.

The service of celebration was held in St. Luke's United Methodist Church, Asheboro, North Carolina, on Friday, June 22. H. Alexander Smith officiated, assisted by Walter H. McKelvey and James H. Graves. Bishop L. Scott Allen preached the sermon. Interment was in Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Asheboro.
