RUTH STANTON MERCER

1907-1968

Mrs. Ruth Stanton Mercer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Stanton of Stantonsburg, North Carolina, was born August 9, 1907. Here she spent her childhood and youth and received her early education. Upon finishing her education in the school of the local

community, she pursued her later studies at Western Carolina Teachers College at Cullowhee, and East Carolina University at Greenville, North Carolina.

She married the Rev. S. E. Mercer on March 16, 1935, during the time he was pastor at the Stantonsburg Methodist Church. In 1936, she and Mr. Mercer served in the appointment at the Franklinton Methodist Church for thirteen years and then moved to the Zebulon-Wendell Charge, serving there for six years, from 1949 to 1954, where Mr. Mercer was serving at the time of his death on November 22, 1954. He was buried in the Stantonsburg Cemetery. Mrs. Mercer was all that could be desired as a minister's wife. She labored with distinction by the side of her husband during the years of his ministry. She was a husband helper, a gracious hostess, an eager and earnest assistant in all of the work of the church.

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Mercer returned to her native home in Stantonsburg, where she was an active member in all activities of the church until her

sudden death on November 25, 1968. At the time of her death she was serving as a member of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

Funeral services were conducted in the Stantonsburg United Methodist Church on November 27, 1968, byt the pastor, Rev. Ray Sparrow. Interment was in the Stantonsburg Cemetery. Both she and her husband loved the following poem by Tennyson:
