VIII. OUR HONORED DEAD

A. Memoirs

John Haber was born November 24, 1878 on a farm near Atchison, Kansas and grew up near Olpe, Kansas. He attended Kansas State Teachers College in Emporia and graduated from Evangelical Theological School in 1904.

He was married to Huldah Doeschner on October 2, 1907 at Sweetwater, Oklahoma. There was one daughter, Elizabeth Mary Hagerty of Marion, Kansas.

John was ordained deacon in 1904 and elder in 1906 through the Evangelical Association. He began his ministry at Sweetwater, Oklahoma and then served the Weatherford field with nine charges with a radius of 50 to 92 miles. He also served the following appointments: Waukomis, Oklahoma and Preston, Nebraska. In Kansas: Worden, Moundridge, Grandview at Hutchinson, Fancy Creek, Mizpah, Hanover, Lost Springs, Humboldt and Derby. He retired in 1951.

He died March 8, 1969 at Newton, Kansas. Services were held at Peterson Funeral Home in Newton and at the Ebenezer Church at Olpe with burial at Pleasant Ridge Cemetery near Olpe.

Charles Matthew Kennaugh was born March 22, 1884 at Ballabeg, Arbory, Isle of Man. He was graduated from Baker University Academy in 1912. He received the BA degree from Denver University and the BD degree from Cliffliff in 1918 and earned the MRE degree at Boston University in 1920.

He married Edith Mann December 17, 1913 at Kansas City, Kansas. Two children were born to them: Mrs. Curtis A. (Esther Lucile) Terrill and Robert Quayle Kennaugh.

Charles received his local preachers license December 24, 1906 and was assigned to the Methodist Episcopal Society of Rothsay, Minnesota. He was received on trial in the Minnesota Conference and ordained deacon October 6, 1907 by Bishop Daniel A. Goodsell. After ordination to elder April 18, 1920 in Haverhill, Massachusetts by Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes, he was received into full connection by the Kansas Conference. He served the following appointments: Quindaro, Kansas City, 1942-46; Centenary, Lawrence, 1947; Sabbatical leave, 1948. He retired in 1949.

He died July 24, 1968 at Shawnee Mission, Kansas. His funeral was at Metropolitan Avenue United Methodist Church July 26 in Kansas City, Kansas. He was buried at Maple Hill Cemetery in Kansas City, Kansas.

Henry Clay Moore, Jr. was born July 11, 1899 at Aberdeen, Mississippi. He studied at Rust College in Holly Springs, Miss., and at Clark College and completed his theological studies at Gammon Theological Seminary in 1937.

He was married to Lillie Timberlick and two sons were born to them, James and George. Both his wife and son James preceded him in death. He was remarried in June of 1937 to Ann Lois Johnson. There were two children born to them: Mary Nina Moore Frazier and Harold Johnson Moore; and a foster daughter, Patricia B. Moore.

Henry was received on trial in 1936 and in full connection in the Central West Conference in 1939. He became a member of the Kansas Conference of the Methodist Church in 1964. He served the following appointments: Jacksonville, Illinois, 37-38; Salina, Quayle, Ks., 39-40; Mason City, Iowa, 41-43; Sedalia, Mo., 44-45; Mexico, Mo., 46-55; Mexico, St. Luke, 56; Topeka, Mt. Olive, 57-64; Manhattan, Shepard Chapel, 66; and retired in 1966.

He died May 21, 1969 at Topeka, Kansas. His funeral service was at Mount Olive United Methodist Church in Topeka, May 27, 1969 with burial at the National Cemetery at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.
