Report of Committee on Quarterly Conference Records

All the records were turned in for examination except those of Bellingham, Deer Creek, and St. Charles.

All the records are now of the loose-leaf type, and nearly all of them are

typewritten, with some corrections.

Signature by either chairman or secretary must be in longhand and must not be omitted. Budget apportionment must be presented and voted on at the first quarterly conference.

There is quite a difference in the amount of space used. Some brethren need only one page, and some need two to six pages. There should be uniformity. When copies of minutes are added to loose-leaf records they should be inserted in their proper places. To place record of minutes for 1939-40 on front

pages of a book, and not after those of 1938-1939, is confusing.

Our records are kept for future reference and should be carefuly written, and inserted where they belong. B. G. Wiff, Chairman; C. G. Roesti, Secretary.
