aloney was born on March 24, 1925 at Morris, Oklahoma. A. degree from Whittier College he served three years in vy. Charles graduated from the Boston University School and was received on trial in the Southern California-Ar

received on trial in the Southern California-Ari zona Conference in the same year. Reverend Maloney became a full member of the Conference in 1959. He served churches in Lancasies, Joshua Tree, and Murrieta. He retired because of health in 1961 and later served as assistant for a year at Yucaipa, and then was placed on disability. Continued ill health prevented him from returning to the active ministry. Death came on January 8, 1967 while he was visiting his parents at Sky Meadows Camp.

Reverend Maloney is survived by his wife Mary Jane, and a daughter, Susan, who live at Montebello, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Maloney of Sky Meadows, and two sisters, Jean Terry and Patsy McIntyre of Montebello.

Ill health prevented Charles Milton Maloney from fulfilling that inner dream of serving the Master through His church.



Esau Perez Munoz was born July 19, 1884 in Saltillo, Coachuila, Mexico. He graduated from Wesleyan Theological College. He married Febronia Florian April 8, 1912.

He was pastor of Villaldama Methodist Church; then he went to Monterrey,



Nuevo Leon, Mexico where he was chaplain of the Methodist Hospital from 1913 to 1915. He was pastor in Torreon, Coahuila, Mexico, 1915-1918; Marfa, Texas circuit, 1918-1919; Sanderson and Alpine Circuit, 1919-1923; Tempe, Ariz., 1923-1925; Miami, Arizona, 1925-1927; Sonora, Arizona, 1927-1930; Phoenix, Arizona, 1930-1936; Tempe, Arizona, 1936-1939; Flagstaff, Arizona, 1939-1942; Prescott, Arizona, 1942-1943; San Fernando, California, 1947-1949; Sonora, Arizona, 1949-1950.

Reverend E. P. Munoz contributed to the following religious periodicals: El Evangelista Mexicano 1912-1916; El Mundo Cristiano 1916-1922; El Atalaya Bautista, 1920-1925; El Mensajero Cristiano, 1923-1930; La Nueva Senda 1936-1941; he was also Assistant Editor of El Heraldo Cristiano of San Antonio and also La Nueva Senda in Los Angeles.

Imprenta Palmore printed his books: Resurrexit in 1924, Florilegio Filial in 1925 (book of poetry dealing mostly with Mother's Day

of poetry dealing mostly with Mother's Day poems) and Multum in Parvo in 1927 (dealing with sundry religious themes).

He died February 14, 1967 and his funeral services were conducted by Reverend Mardoqueo B. Garcia at the Primera Iglesia Metodista Church in Phoenix, Arizona.

Survivors include his wife Febronia F. Munoz and his children, Dr. Rosalio F. Munoz, Lucinda M. Perez, Rebecca M. Gutierrez, Elizabeth M. Grijalva, Josephine M. Rodriguez, Rev. Solomon M. Munoz and Abel F. Munoz.
