**ALMA A. LOWE**

Alma A. Lowe was born April 1, 1887, in Boscobel, Wisconsin. She met Willard I Lowe in her senior high school year and they were married in Boscobel in 1915.

In 1910, she graduated from kindergarten and primary education courses at Indiana's Valparaiso University. She taught in the Government Indian School at Greenville, California. Thereafter, she taught in Arizona at Glendale and Phoenix prior to her marriage. In their first Arizona parish at Williams, she established a private kindergarten school.

Willard joined the Wisconsin Conference following graduation from Boston University School of Theology where the Lowes served a student charge at East Gloucester, Massachusetts. Here Alma organized the community's first Camp Fire Girl's group. They then ministered for four years at Blue River and Menomonee, Wisconsin. Their daughter Ardith Helen was born at Blue River.

In 1948 they retired to Corona, one of their eight pastorates in our Conference. Here Willard died in 1956. Alma continued to live there for two years until she entered Kingsley Manor where she died January 24, 1971, leaving a host of friends in eleven parishes as well as at the Manor.

She was unfailingly appreciative of the ministries of the Manor where she did her share in contributing to its life until strength failed.

Surviving her are a daughter Ardith Lowe Kane of Ripley, California; one brother, Jay A. Ricks of Boscobel, Wisconsin; four grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

**FEBRONIA FLORIAN MUNOZ**

Febronia Florian Munoz was in her 85th year when on October 3, 1970, she entered the House of Light. She was the widow of the Rev. Esau Perez Munoz, a minister in the Methodist Church from 1911 to 1967. Mrs. Munoz was a graduate Deaconess of Colegio Ingles in San Luis Potosi. She served as a Deaconess alongside her husband in their ministry. She was a very able woman, a gifted homemaker and a dedicated servant of our Lord. She was proud of her fine family of seven children. Five of the children became teachers; one is a professor at U.C.L.A. and one a minister, the Reverend Solomon Munoz of our Conference.

Her husband was a preacher, writer and poet and was honored as one of the Religious Leaders of America in 1941-42. Rev. Esau Munoz and Febronia shared a marriage of over 55 happy years.

Death came "no conqueror in the end" for surely she heard a voice saying, "Come up higher."
