### ALONZO W. MANNING

Rev. Olonzo W. Manning was born in Wapakoneta, Ohio, January 18, 1872. He was the son of William and Martha Manning. After completing his high school course he attended Ohio Wesleyan University from which he graduated in 1899.

He was married to Miss Ruby Longenecker, September 10, 1901. To this union there were born five daughters, Betty and Mary Manning, at home; Mrs. K. E. Murphy, Mrs. Howard Rensch, and Mrs. D. McVicker, all of Galion; and three sons, Samuel at home, W. R. Manning of Zanesville, and Robert Manning of Galion.


He was received on trial in the North Ohio Conference in 1902 and into full membership in 1905. He served the following charges with great acceptability: Keene and Clark, Beallsville and Butler, Ontario, Hayesville, Kimbolton, Adamsville, West Bellaire, Chandlersville, and Powhatan Point. On account of failing health he took the retired relationship in 1927.

During his retirement he has made himself useful in the communities in which he resided, having spent ten years of this time in Galion.

Brother Manning was well educated and had a well grounded understanding of the Bible. He was a good minister of our Lord and Master.



### WILLIAM CARL PAUTZ

William Carl Pautz was born at Arnprior, Ontario, Canada, August 14, 1887, one of a family of five sons and two daughters. He was overtaken by death suddenly on May 9, 1940, while in the midst of a widely influential service of teaching and Christian ministry. His parents, Ferdinand and Wilhelmina, died some years ago, his father in 1927 and his mother in 1928. Three brothers and one sister survive: Herman, of Buckingham, Quebec; John, of Ottawa; Gordon, of Toronto; and Mrs. George Grandmaison, of Buckingham.

When nineteen years of age, William was converted and united with the Evangelical Church of Canada. He was called to the Christian ministry and
