FRANK JUDSON PERRIN, son of Daniel and Emily Perrin, was born near Pawpaw, Ill., April 11, 1858. While yet a child, he moved with his parents to Iowa. At the age of seventeen his family removed to Texas and located in Bexar County, near the town of Boerne. He spent two years in school in Connecticut. In 1884 he joined the West Texas Conference, and served the following charges: Carrizo Springs, Center Point, Kerrville, Hondo, Utopia, Amphion, Fairview, Wade City, Sweet Home, Clear Creek, Boerne, Manchaca, and Johnson City. In 1904 he moved to Georgetown. In 1908 he took the supernumerary relation and kept it to the end of his life. In 1886 he was married to Miss Mary Matthews, of Carrizo Springs. To this union were born twelve children. One died in infancy. His wife and eleven children survive him. He died at his home in Georgetown, Tex., September 3, 1933.—*R. S. Adair.*

JACOB MOONEY SHUFORD, son of John and Cynthia Shuford, was born in Lincoln County, N. C., February 13, 1845. When seventeen years old he enlisted in the Confederate army. He spent nineteen months in a Federal prison. After the war he settled near Denton, Tex., where, in 1875, he was converted, and was licensed to preach by the Methodist Church. After several years as a supply pastor, he joined the Northwest Texas Conference in 1880. He was ordained elder by the West Texas Conference in 1884. Appointments served in this Conference were: Pontotoc, Kerrville, Pearsall, Cuero, and Center Point, where, in 1885, he was married to Miss Mary Jane Barton, of Kerr County, and who preceded him in death in 1896. He took the superannuate relation in 1905. Brother Shuford died last summer, at Colorado, Tex. For more than fifty years he was an active member of the Masonic Order. Surviving him are his children: J. W. Shuford, Mrs. R. S. Schuhmann, Mrs. Tom Hughes, Sidney B. and Jacob Shuford, Jr., and a sister, Mrs. Alice Halliday.—*A. E. Rector.*
