David Seaman was born in Kansas City, Mo., on Oct. 12, 1916. He died in Kennewick, Wash., on March 24, 1960, at the age of 43. He was educated at Baker University, Garrett Biblical Institute, and Northwestern University. He entered the Central Kansas Conference on trial in 1943; transferred to the Oregon Conference in 1944, served several churches there and was for a time director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Oregon.
