



### THOMAS W. RIPPY

Thomas W., oldest son of James and Eliza Ann Rippy, was born at Sugar Grove, Tennessee, in 1881. He died at Findlay, May 14, 1953, after

They were parents of two children, Mrs. Glen Valentine of Rushville, and James of Middle Grove. Having lost his wife by death, he was married in 1940 to Florence Bearce of Lewistown, who survives him.

### ORVILLE THANE ROGERS

In the death of Orville Thane Rogers, our Illinois Conference lost a member with whom it had small acquaintance, as he came to us as a member in the Retired Relation of the Illinois Conference of the Southern Methodist

Yet he was a product of our Conference, born at LeRoy on February 22, 1861; a graduate of the State Normal, at Normal, when that was the unusual thing; a teacher in the Paxton schools. He was married to Miss Addie Short on Christmas Day, 1884. His decision to become a Methodist minister came at Paxton, induced by the death of his born child, but, due to the frail health of Mrs. Rogers, he went to New Mexico as a missionary

Later he was a member of the North Texas Conference, where he served until 1925, when he returned to Illinois. He was a revivalist, who balanced the love and Fatherhood of God with the justice and dignity of

Death came for him in Dallas, Texas, December 27, 1952. His wife had preceded him in death in 1929. He is survived by three daughters; Mrs. Company of the Ballah B H. Thomas, Dallas, Texas, and Mrs. Edith Reed and Mrs. Beulah Bright, both of Lewisville, Texas. There are fifteen grandchildren, and four great grandchildren. Burial was in the Old Hall cemetery, Lewisville, Texas.

### T. WALTER THOMPSON

Thomas Walter Thompson was born on November 25, 1886, at Piper City, Illinois, and died at St. Petersburg, Florida, on January 16, 1953, years in the ministry, he attended the University of Chicago, and later completed the correspondence course of that University. In 1944, he was granted the Retired Relation on account of ill health.

Dr. Thompson held many important positions on Conference Boards and Commissions. For 14 years he was the treasurer of the Board of Conference Claimants. He was a director of the Preachers Aid Society and a trustee of the hospital at Peoria. He was deeply interested in young
