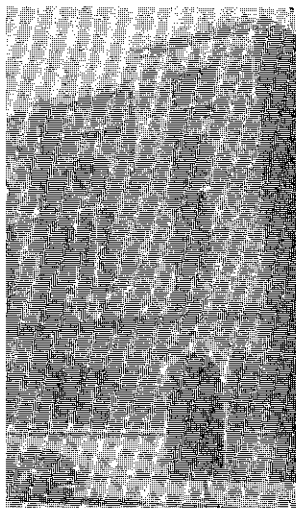

CALEB WARREN SHOCKLEY

Shockley, was born February 24, 1882, in Philadelphia, Pa.

In 1905 he received his B.S. degree at Dover State College. Early in life he accepted Christ as his Saviour. In young adulthood he felt the urgent call to the ministry, as had his father and many other members of his family. He often told how he tried to follow a different path but, finally had to submit to the Lord's will and carry the gospel. Following his ordination he pastored a number of churches in the Philadelphia and Delaware Conferences of the Methodist Church. He has not held a pastorate for a number of years, but has remained actively associated with the conference and continually preached the gospel.

Abiding faith in the sustaining power of God seemed to chart a course for him through life. Whatever his need, a way always opened for him. Many will remember his frequent assertions that he was growing younger every day. Truly he was blest with a vibrant spirit and remarkably good health. Though of a large family he leaves only his brother Alphonso of Philadelphia, one nephew, three nieces, and many cousins, among whom are the Reverends Leon and Noah Moore.
