He attended the Kimball School of Theology at Salem, Oregon. He was admitted on trial in PNW Conference in 1922. He served Okanogan, Oroville, Anatone, and Kendrick, Idaho.

Following retirement in 1950, he continued to serve in many ways. He assisted at Brooks and Donald, Oregon, and helped a struggling little community church in southern Oregon. He returned to Washington and served as lay pastor at Shelton, and as pastor of the community church at Hoodsport.

In 1959 he moved to Wesley Gardens where he continued his service as

teacher and leader of vesper services until his death.
