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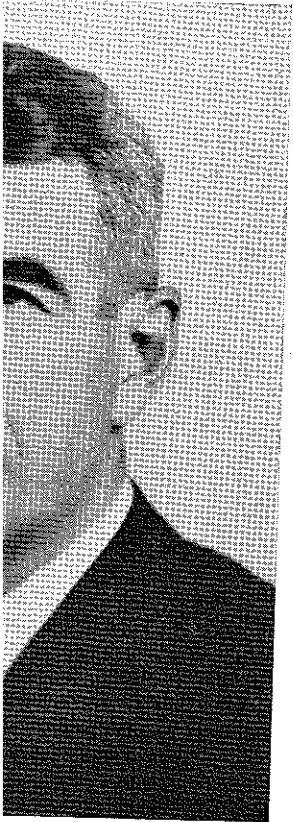
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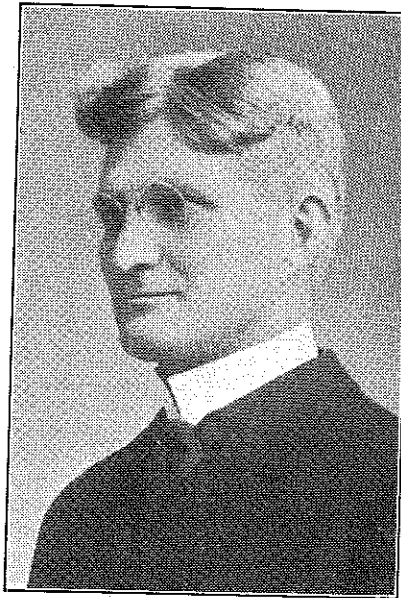

John Kessler Stetler, son of Benjamin F. Stetler and Elizabeth Kreider Stetler, was born in West Willow, Pennsylvania, August 30th, 1874.
