REV. W. H. STRICKLIN.

Rev. William H. Stricklin, D. D., was born in Wayne county, Tenn., January 27, 1863. Departed this life suddenly March 3rd, 1906, aged 43 years, 1 month, and 8 days. Dr. Stricklin entered the Central Tennessee Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the year 1889 and for a little more than fifteen years shared with his brethren the sunshine and shadows of life in the Methodist itinerancy. After spending eleven years in the pastorate serving with efficiency and great credit such charges as Lawrenceburg, Lexington and Tullahoma, he was appointed by Bishop Fowler to the Presiding Eldership which position he held with credit to himself and honor to the Church for a period of four years. At the last session of the Conference he was appointed by Bishop McCabe to the pastorate of Eighth Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church in the city of Nashville, Tennessee. As a pastor he began his work on this important charge with his characteristic vigor and efficiency; and yet, alas! in the midst of his activity and great usefulness he was stricken down. On Saturday Morning, March 3rd, with hardly a moments notice he left us and went to be with God, being run over by a street car in the city of Nashville and suddenly killed. We bow our heads in mute sorrow and inexpressible grief in the presence of such horrible disaster. We shall miss his manly form in our annual assemblies. His strong commanding voice will no longer thrill us in the conflicts of life. By and by we shall see him and enjoy fellowship with him in that blest land where sudden calamity never appalls and where partings never come. To his stricken companion, bereaved children, sorrowing relatives and friends we offer our tenderest sympathy in this their noon of great trial.
