JOHN NICHOLAS LINK

John Nicholas Link was born in Baltimore, Maryland, January 28, 1893, the son of John Henry Link and Margaret Edler Link.

He received his early education in the public schools of Baltimore, and higher academic instruction at Western Maryland College, Westminster, Maryland (A. B. and M. A.), He received two other degrees at Westminister Theological Seminary (S. T. B. and S. T. D.) Other graduate studies were pursued at Teachers College, Columbia University, New York City, and Union Theological Seminary, New York City.

His earliest religious instruction was received in the Faith Reformed Church, Baltimore

Maryland. He received Elder's ordination in April, 1913.

Among the appointments served by Dr. Link were: Fairfax Methodist Protestant Circuit. Fairfax County, Virginia; Warwick Circuit, Warwick, Maryland; Accomac Circuit Accomac County, Virginia; Deer Park Circuit, Smallwood, Maryland; Grace Methodist Protestant Church, Baltimore, Maryland; Starr Methodist Protestant Church, Baltimore, Maryland: First Methodist Protestant Church, Newark, New Jersey; Westminister Theological Seminary, Department of Practical Theology; Peninsula Methodist Church Wilmington, Delaware; District Superintendent, Wilmington District, Peninsula Conference: Retired to Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, May 1959.

On May 31, 1911, John Nicholas Link married Jennie Elizabeth (Britcher) Link Mrs. Link continues to live at the Methodist Manor House where the couple enjoyed their later years together. Their son, John Howard Link, a Methodist minister, presently serves at

Cumberland, Maryland.

In retirement, Dr. Link continued to pursue an active life. While residing in Rehoboth, he became active in civic and church affairs, and accepted occasional appointments. At the Methodist Manor House he was instrumental in starting the School of Continuing Education in which he served as dean and instructor. He organized a group of retired ministers into the Manor House Volunteer Pastoral Care Staff. He assumed responsibility for occasional stereo concerts, and frequently introduced chapel speakers.

Among his lifelong interests were teaching, counseling, administration, music, and literature. He was a popular speaker and was often called upon. His church career included leading interdenominational groups and holding the position of trustee with the Methodist Country House and Western Maryland College. He was a long term member of Kiwanis

International, and the Masonic Order.

Following a brief illness, he died on Friday March 2 in the Nanticoke Memorial Hospital. Seaford, Delaware. Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Preston Spence and the Rev. Brooks Reynolds at the McCrery Memorial Funeral Home, Talleyville, Delaware on Tuesday, March 6, 1979. Interment was in Gracelawn Abbey, Gracelawn Memorial Park,

Wilmington, Delaware.

John Nicholas Link was a complete minister of the gospel. All of the ministerial offices found rich fulfillment in him. He had a pastor's compassion, a counselor's keen insight and nounce standing, a preacher's depth of conviction and gift of utterance, a teacher's analytical and presentational skills, an administrator's sound judgment, levened with intuition. The Peninsula Conference is enriched by the years that he dwelt among us.

ESSELL PARKS THOMAS, D.D.

Essell Parks Thomas was born August 23, 1890 at Landonville, Somerset County, Maryland, the son of Captain William J. Thomas and Emma Jane Parks Thomas. He attended the Wilmington Conference Academy (Wesley College) Dover, Delaware and then entered Meridian College, Meridian, Mississippi. After graduating from Meridian College, he completed his formal preparation for the ministry at Drew Seminary, Madison, New Jersey.

On June 14, 1921, he married Miss Elsie Mae Dennis of Newark, Maryland. They had two

children, Mary Anne and Essell Parks, Jr.

He was ordained and became a member of the Wilmington Conference in 1914. During his 42 years in the active ministry he served as pastor of Methodist Churches at Pittsville, Maryland; Ocean City, Maryland; Epworth Church, Wilmington, Delaware; Centenary United Methodist Church, Laurel, Delaware; Asbury Church, Smyrna, Delaware; Wesley Church, Dover, Delaware; Ebenezer Church, Easton, Maryland; St. Paul's, Wilmington; and Atonement Church, Claymont, Delaware, in addition to his six year tenure as Superintendent of the Easton District. He retired from the Peninsula Annual Conference in 1956. Dr. Thomas was active in Peninsula Conference programs and was elected as a delegate to three Jurisdictional Conferences and one General Conference. In 1950, Western Maryland College awarded him the honorary degree of doctor of divinity in recognition of

his outstanding work as a minister of The Methodist Church.

Following his retirement, Mrs. Thomas and he lived in Chestertown, Maryland and later Easton, Maryland. They became residents of The Methodist Manor House, Seaford Delaware in 1973. For many of these retirement years, he actively pursued a vocation of many years' interest, the buying, selling and appraising of rare and used books. He specialized in religious books and in books dealing with the history of Delaware and Maryland.

He died at The Methodist Manor House on Wednesday, October 25, 1978 after a lengthy illness. He is survived by his wife, Elsie Dennis Thomas of Seaford Delaware, one sister Elizabeth T.
