#### ROBERT RENO TUCKER

It was thirty-six years ago that Rev. Robert R. Tucker cast his lot as a Methodist minister with the South Carolina Conference, and for all of those years with the exception of the last two, he was active in the ministry of his Lord. While quiet in his manner, yet he was aggressive and a good organizer. Therefore the charges that he served went forward on a secure foundation.

Mr. Tucker was born at Lyerly, Ga., September 30, 1882, his parents being James Samuel Tucker and Mrs. Dora Carolina Sewell Tucker. Mr Tucker was elucated in the public schools of his home community, the Chattatooga, Ga., high school and the Martha Berry School, of Rome, Ga. He then attended the Vanderbilt University School of Religion, graduating in 1914.

On July 15, 1911, Mr. Tucker was licensed to preach by the Dalton District of the North Georgia Conference. He was admitted on trial into the Tennessee Annual Conference in 1913, and for the year following his admission, he served Wynns Chapel in the city of Nashville. At the close of 1914, he was transferred to the South Carolina Annual Conference, was received into full connection and ordained a deacon in 1915, and an elder in 1917.

Mr. Tucker was for a quadrennium chairman of the Epworth League Board for three years dean of the Young People's Assembly. Not only was he zealous for the spiritual welfare of both young and old, but he was interested in improving the physical property of the church. This was manifested by his leadership in several important building enterprises. Outstanding among them was the erection of the beautiful church building at McBee.

Having been in declining health for several years, Mr. Tucker was granted the retired relation at the Conference of 1948. He answered the final summons at noon of October 11, 1950, while sitting on the Porch of his home, 3906 Main Street, Columbia. His body was laid to rest in the city cemetery of Sumter, S. C.

Mr. Tucker was first married to Miss Mary Elizabeth Cannon of Georgetown, April 12, 1916. He was married, second, to Miss Lois Steele Richardson, also of Georgetown, April 19, 1921. She, with their daughter, Elinor Louise, survives.
