Mrs. Gertrude Buchanan Gray was born in Webster August 23, 1872, and died at Spindale June 10, 1923.

She was married to Rev. J. J. Gray November 15, 1896, and was faithful helpmeet and strong support to her husband through many years of his ministry. For several years she was an invalid, but bore affliction bravely, and when the end came there was great peace.
