AYRES, HARRIET

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MISS HARRIET L. AYRES was born near Hillsboro, Ohio, March 18, 1864. At fifteen years of age Miss Ayres united with the Methodist Church at her home where her parents and six brothers and sisters were already members. Later this church was disbanded and Miss Ayres, grown indifferent to church matters, did not take her letter with her parents to the church immediately in Hillsboro. At last in 1892 her interest was again aroused on the second Sabbath of December through the sermon of her pastor. Dr. Ketchum, and she felt a clear, strong call to foreign missions. But Miss Ayres had determined not to obey this call; there seemed something fanatical to her in a girl's leaving family and friends for work in distant lands, and when Miss Loyd, now her beloved coworker in Mexico, gave herself to the foreign field. Miss Ayres wondered at such a lack of wisdom in one she had ever admired. In the Spring of 1883 she taught school and returned

to her high school work in the Autumn. At length in the New Year, 1884, she gave up the unhappy struggle, and by the chair at which her mother had taught her her childish prayers, promised God she would do the work for which she was needed, wherever it should be. After another period of summer teaching, she entered Hillsboro Female Seminary of which Miss Loyd's father was President, and in December, 1886, she went to Mexico under the auspices of the Cincinnati Branch. In the January Conference she was appointed as assistant of Miss Loyd in Mexico, where she is now doing noble and successful work. A few months in 1890 and 1893 have been spent in her own country.

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MISS GRACE STEPHENS is an Eurasian by birth and was

discovered by Dr. and Mrs. Rudisill in their work in Madras. In April, 1886, Miss Stephens began woman's work in that great city and has developed into an ideal missionary. It is Miss Stephens who not only has found women behind the purdah, but persuaded them in many cases to come out. After working some time she became a deaconess, and in our Deaconess Home in Madras is doing invaluable work. Her

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servant, she escaped with but a slight wound from a terrible death. The nervous shock and the experience of the following

death. The nervous shock and the experience of the following days, made it advisable that she return home as soon as possible. She reached this country in September, 1895, for a year's furlough, doing excellent service as a speaker in the home field during her sojourn in America.

MISS ELLA C. SHAW of Morrisville, Ind., sailed for Nanking, China, June 20, 1887, under the auspices of the Northwestern Branch. After five years of evangelistic service she returned to this country, spending most of her time in the Chicago Training School. Sept. 17, 1894, she returned to be a cld post at Vanking, where associated with Miss Mitchell
