REV. THEODORE C. BADLEY

Mr. Badley is a member of one of the oldest Methodist missionary families in India. He is the son of the Reverend Brenton H. Badley, pioneer missionary in India and founder of the Christian College at Lucknow. This college was then known as Reid Christian College, and is now one of the most important educational institutions in India.

Mr. Badley was born in Lucknow, in 1879, and along with his brother, Bishop Brenton T. Badley, received his early training in the schools of India.

In 1892, Mr. Badley came to the United States to continue his studies. He entered Simpson College, where several generations of Badleys have studies. He has a Bachelor's degree from Ohio Wesleyan University, and his Master's gegree from Columbia University.

When Mrs Badley became a missionary of our Board, in 1903, and returned to India, he took up the work his father had laid down in 1891 - he became president of the Lucknow Christian College. As president of the college, Mr. Badley took his place among the prominent educators in India.

Mr. Badley was largely responsible for the development of a system of shorthand for the in the Hindustani language. This work was done at the request of the British Government, and has proved of great practical value in many ways. Among other things it has enabled the British authorities to conduct more government business in the vernacular, and saves time. The School of Commerce of the Christian University is extremely popular with the government, and many young men are sent there at the expense of the government to study the shorthand system and general business methods. All policemen who are to be registered for the vallage courts must attend this school.

Mr. Badley besides being an able educator, is a Christian gentleman, and the influence of his life and personality has touched thousands of students. He has an understanding heart and a deep insight into political conditions as they are in India today, and because he is a leader in the adjustment of the Lethodist Episcopal Church forces in India to the new spirit of nationalism, he resigned the presidency of Lucknow Christian College, that a man of Indian blood might assume the responsibility of leadership of his own people.

Then it. Badley returned to India after his furlough in 1930, he became superintendent of Dehli District, a responsible position involving the combined duties of evengelist, teacher, superviser and adviser to thousands of individuals scattered over a vast territory.

Mr. Badley resides in the city of Delhi, the capital of India, a famous ancient city, the ninth of its name the first having been built fifty years before the birth of Christ. It is the ninth largest city in India and is the junction for nine railways. The city has a population of more than 300,000.

while more than 1,000,000 Hindus and Mohammedans live within the borders of the Delhi District. Our Church is responsible for about half of theis number.

Mr. Badley is busily and successfully engaged in preaching the Gospel of Christ - a Gospel that is surely, though slowly undermining the caste system of India. It is through the work of Mr. Badley and others like hom that eventually the inhuman religious, social and economic systems so long fostered by Hinduism will be entirely broken down.

In 1904, Mr. Badley was married to Miss Clara Nelson of Delaware, Ohio, a grandniece of Bishop James M. Thoburn of India. There are three sons and three daughters in the Badley family.

THEODORE CHARLES BADLEY

Reverend Theodore C. Badley, is a member of one of the oldest Methodist missionary families in India, being the son and grandson of pioneer missionaries there. He was born at Lucknow and received his education in the United States. He is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and is now in this country with a missionary scholarship to Union Theological Seminary, New York.

In India Mr. Badley won a name for himself in mission circles, especially in education. He served for years with the Lucknow Christian College, an institution maintained by the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was president of Reid Christian College, Lucknow, a subsidiary institution, and superintendent of education of the Methodist Mission forces in India, later general educational secret ry.

as president of Lucknow Christian College Mr. Badley became known as one of the prominent educators in India. He took a leading part in developing a system of short-hand for Hindustani at the behast of the British Government and the school of commerce of Lucknow College educates many men for positions at the expense of the Government. The use of this short-hand system has enabled the British authorities to conduct more government business in the vernacular and with greater despatch than ever before, as well as obtaining reports of speeches made by agitators in that language, which is one of the great vernaculars of India, the others being Hindi and Telegu.

The recent upheavals in India, the non-cooperationist movement of Gandhi and the Ali brothers, have been close to hr. Badley as one of the leaders in mission thought there, which has been one of understanding of the faults and virtues of both sides in the controversy. Hr. Badley's insight into the rising spirit of independence in India is from close range, as he resigned the presidency of Lucknow Christian College that a man of Indian blood might assume the responsibility of leadership of his own people. His story of the adjustment of the Methodist Episcopal Church forces in India to the new spirit of nationalism is one of absorbing interest. to persons interested in mission activities.

Dear Friends,

Three months have slipped past since my last latter was addressed and we are now in the beautiful hill station of Paini Tal. This is a summer resort which is the head-quarters of the local government and is one of the most picturesque spots in North India. Within twelve miles of the plains, the regged Himalayas rise to a height of ever 7000 feet and nestled at the height of 6500 feet in the bosom of these mountains is a Leautiful deep blue lake arout a mile in length by 1; mile vido. At one end of this lake our rission has what is called the Samitarium which is a luilding having spites for eight families and it is our privilege to have one of these suites. On the bill sides that rise from the lake, on the north is located the Philander Smith College and High School which is conducted by our mission for Missionary and European toye. On the opposite hill is the Wellesley Girls' School which is a similar institution for the Missionary and European girls. In addition to these, our dission also conducts a large iny rehool for Indian boys but n as the Humphrey Memorial High och of. We also have a beautiful little church for Europeans and one for the Indian members of the community. So you see for mission has large interests in this station.
