> HISTORY OF MY LIFE. I. Sylvia E. Aldrich cas born on a farm in Punkin Hallow! Lyons Township, Ionia County Michigan, August 8th, 1896. Early childhood along with that of a Baby brother's was spent there. Then I was nearly five years old we moved to a farm near Falo, Michigan ... live there only a year and then moved to a farm near Sheridan, Michigan. Here my first sigter was born.

After a year or two father was tired of farming, so we moved to Lyons, Lichigan. We lived there part of the time and part of the time went with my father on the Construction jobs, living in tents. One of these places impressed me very much as my brother and I went to school with the

Indian children. We were the only white children in that District. Ly early education as obtained in the little red school houses in the various places where we lived. After moving to Lyons I entered school there and completed my grade and high school education the eggraduating as Valedictorian of the class.

when I was around ten years of age I was definetely converted and joined the courch. During my study of feography, I became very much interested in China and the Chinese ... One might during by early years a definite call ame to me to prepare for the Mission field. From that time on all my thoughts and activities here directed to that end. I joined all the organizations that told enything about Hissions, King's Heralds, Standard Dearers, Student Volenteers etc. Iroad everytiing I could find on Chine as well as other countries.

"Yes". The rest of that summer and fall was spent in jetting ready.
I was still under contract to teach in Flint, and kept the possibility
a secret from teachers and students until my application to the womans'
Foreign Missionary Society was accepted. I resigned at Thanksjiving
time. The students and teachers were very much surprised but were
anxious that I go as well.

On January 7th, 1922 we sailed for China. This was my first Ocean trip and I enjoyed every bit of it. We arrived at the station in Minchwa China, on the 22nd of February 1922.

The first year and half was spent in language study, full time the first year and half time the second year, and every year after that as time afforded. Part time during the second year I worked with one of the Chinese teachers writing the material for the Training Course. There was nothing in Chinese available in Methods, kina ement etc. By third year I began teaching from the material that we had worked out. This was all done in Chinese. I am not sure what the students learned but I learned a great deal, what looks fine on paper does not always work in reality. We were changing the material all the time to get the best results.

By first furlough came after school in June of 1926. It was saldened by the death of my only brother (hicked by a horse). I got off the train at ten P.L. heard the news and boarded the train the next morning to attend the funeral. By combine how was a blessing to my mother and to my sister-in-law and their uncorn child.

In September of 'A6, I re-entered my all a latter to comfete my a.g. decree. This was complited in succer of 1927. That fall I spent in mealing and proparing to return to the field. I arrived on the Field in 1928.

This term of service was some fift wont as the revolution of '27 had taken place and all places of responsibility in schools had taken over by the Chinese and the schools relister durith the jovernment. Our High school had to take a choice between training teachers or preprint students for college. The committee doke the latter. They were sorry in any or are so but nothing could be done then. The covernment took over the two ining or teachers, reduced the standard and type of teacher. We continued to use our own High school quadwates giving them in eservice—their in 'this was by take and it proved a very challenging one and the teachers really learned more on the job than in the class room. Besides this supervision and training, I seemed to "pinch-hit" in most all positions when of ers went on further or when someone decided she did not want that position. This 'putty' job was good encounternees and I certainly learned about all the tasks on a mission field.

In Job. of 1997 following a five weeks trek in the villages, I returned to the Lission house. That hight I had a severe attack of Gall Bladder trouble. After a week the bission doctor sent me to Shanghai where I was operated on Earch 1st. I was to leave the hospital when the Chinese doctor discovered a blood clot. This was partially absorbed. From that time on I continued to improve that in the Spring of 1934 I went to Presbyterian College of Christian Education for a refresher course.

Here my plans were changed. The head of the bible department was determined that I work on a M.A.degree. She arranged that the courses I had taken would count. She also arranged for me to take two correspondence courses after I returned to China.

I arrived on the Field in August of 1934. Because of a semirevolution in Fukien, I was sent to Peiping to study Mandarin, the language the government was trying to make the "niversal one. This was another great experience and a great help in the school work as all teaching in schools had to be done in that dislect. I returned to Minghwa on Jan.1st 1955.

During this term I also had various positions, little Women, Eible school work, helping to prepare works and men for an ely Pastors, supervision of the schools, preaching in the churches etc. It was my privilege this term to begin definite training for Lay workers, as well as training paid workers. Our higher course was given in Poochow at the Theological College, several of the women from the Fible were able to qualify and tack the advanced training. The Lay work was a boom to the churches in the villeges as they had permanent leaders, the pistors moved and then the leadership was your. It was durin this term that I began Institute for the Preschers vives. Some of the preschers had wives who had very little education, were not able to help in the church work. These women were, I believe the most appreciative (except the Lopers) of all the groups that attended Institutes.

In 1939 I returned again or furlough. I returned to the Presby-terion ollege of Christian Maussion in January of 1940, where I conspleted by work for my letter's Degree in December. Since there was no rid-term graduation, I returned in June of '41 and was graduated with the class of 41. By Thesis was on "The Origin and Development of the Principle Versions of the Chinade Bible". The Fall of '49 I spent speaking and attending Conferences. Since the China field secmed to be closed I began to think about another sield of Service.

Ever since the inification of the churches I had wanted to to south to see things there at first hand. I decided to go to George Peabody and get a M.A. degree in Secondary Education. I entered the College in January 1950. I lived at Scarritt college taking courses in Enthropology under Dr. Brown. I was graduated from George Peabody in the Auter of 1950. During the time there I was approached about Soing to So. Rhodesia to teacher in the Teacher Training school. Since that was one of my interests. I agreed.

I sailed for So. Rhodesia in Oct. 1950 arriving at the station on the 17th of Hovember. Schools were in the last days of the school year so I made myself useful joing but to help with the examining of the Day schools.

I began my traching in the Teacher Training behool in January of 1951. I was a bit disappointed after I arrived on the field to find that the Teacher Training Course was for lover primary work, in which I had had no training or experience. However, I be an to make the best of it and after the first year managed to jet down to the level of 1- students understanding. The students take the course all in ang. which is a foreign language to them. Witnessing for Christ and trying to jet others to believe in him is the cause the world over and the students of the Training school soon found a way into my heart.
