Dear Dr. Terry-

I telegraphed you yesterday afternoon that Bishop Burns died at 100. I requested that Bp. Jones should come on and preach at 3 00 Tuesday afternoon. I fear I shall have to preach. His body is embalmed, and will be sent to Liberia by the Stevens in May. Mrs. Burns will return with it. I ought to have said he dies without a struggle-life burnt out-he spoke three minutes before he died-indeed was thought to be a little better within 5 minutes of his death. He was reduced to a mere skeleton. In all his conversations he manifested great peace-deep calm quiet. It was a beautiful death-but not triumphant.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1853.—The General Missionary Committee, the Board of Managers, and the Bishops, at a joint meeting, made the following appropriations for the service of the mission during the year 1853:—  
 The appropriations for the Domestic missions amount to \$181,093; and for the Foreign field, \$25,907; making a total of \$207,000.  
 DOMESTIC MISSIONS: For German Domestic missions, \$28,500; Foreign population other than German, that is, Scandinavian, French, Welsh, and Chinese, \$12,500; Indian missions, \$16,299; native population distributed throughout the thirty-eight confessions, \$136,794.  
 FOREIGN MISSIONS: for Africa, \$36,407; China, \$10,000; France, \$5,000; Norway and Sweden, \$2,000; South America, \$2,000; New Mexico, \$2,000.  
 The contributions to the missionary treasury during the year 1851 amounted to \$226,512.

**Form of Application for Aid.**

Applications for aid should be signed by the Preacher in charge, and also, if practicable, by the Presiding Elder of the District. Every application should state distinctly—  
1. The name of the school and place for which aid is asked, and the Congregation, District, and Appointment to which it belongs.  
2. The average number of persons worshipping in the congregation to which the school is attached.  
3. The average number of teachers engaged in the school.  
4. The average number of scholars attending.  
5. The average number of scholars able to read.  
6. The number and kind of books on hand.  
7. Amount raised per year on the circuit or station to aid the Sunday-School Union.  
8. The precise manner in which books should be forwarded.  
9. The Post Office, County, and State where the applicant may be addressed by mail.

Various other particulars might be added, according to the circumstances of the case.

Grants are often delayed for want of full information respecting some important points overlooked by the applicants.  
When books are granted, notice is sent to the applicant of the amount of the grant, and of the time and manner of forwarding.  
The receipt of books from the Union ought always to be acknowledged. Statements respecting their usefulness should also be made to the Union in due time.

FRIDAY, January 18.

After breakfast went to Millburg. Arranged for repairs there much needed & for improving the grounds. Dined with several friends at Br Groff. Enjoyed myself very well. Other part of last Wednesday as an abstinence day in anticipation of this.

SATURDAY, January 19.

Spent last night at White Plains. Made further observations with reference to the way matters are managed. Found for myself & convinced others that we are paying too much for labor & that by the day & by the month is not as a general thing the best way to hire help. spoke plainly. My Conscience commands me.

SUNDAY, January 20.

Home yesterday at 3. This morning not well. Took canoe & 2 boys, went to Lower Caldwell & preached a funeral sermon on the death of John Cook. An unpleasant case infusion of shells & sweets. Congregation large. Spoke at M. S. H. Comm.

MONDAY, January 21.

Little or no rest last night or the night before. Many little things to be done & met the White Plains Committee. Spoke before them my views with relation to that place.

Discharged M. S. Hooper from our service at White Plains. Elected his ex. S. D. Benson a member of our committee.

TUESDAY, January 22.

Unwell. Seven. Dinner by his ex. S. D. Benson in Claver piazza of the Semi-nary. Went to Cohen about moving out S. of Matthews. Rev Daniel Ward departed this for a better life, at 9 P. M. no doubt in place.

Heard Rev George Thompson of the Anti-Slavery Mission all A.M.

Bro Home at 3 - Lect. Adv. "What think ye of Christ?" A.S.P.M. "Have faith in God."

The morning sermon was a direct & clear & forcible exposé of truth. Praise God for such preaching. Christ Jesus the Lord the theme -

Removal from the old mission to the Benedict farm as it is called

It was very quiet & quieted. We had less trouble than we had apprehended. I remain the old study at the mission, as there is no room for it where we go.

Bad night's rest. I had ketor heat - a bad smell from something I think, dead in the wall - I yawned & sneezed & crying some. - Got a barrel washer

Have given up my self anew to the Lord - Came down to my study, & set to writing as usual. Not well

Settling up some old accounts for mission - Paid A. Blackledge an amount of some 10 years standing on the Upper Coldwell Church. Weather cool. Hard rain most of the day yesterday. Want to do right the good.

THURSDAY, January 31.

At my study at 9  
 Read Thucydides.  
 Interesting, but not  
 sufficiently so to keep  
 me awake after two  
 or three nights broken  
 rest. Was mortifying to  
 me to be nodding over  
 ones books, when they  
 are anxious observe  
 every sentence, & learn  
 something.

FRIDAY, February 1.

In my chair at the  
 usual hour, writing to  
 Wilbur a long letter. I  
 dossed a draft from Mr  
 J. Cooper, which a forget-  
 ful missionary omitted  
 to endorse. At home

 on Administration.

SATURDAY, February 2.

Out of sorts. Caution  
 we take broken of my  
 rest. Unceasingly tor-  
 mented after we lay down

The thought expressed yesterday is vital to me. So much so that I have asked the board to allow me to go back to an inferior & a cheaper station. I hope I am not too ambitious but I do want to be comfortable.

WEDNESDAY, February 6.

Word of writing. Have much on hand by the Commodore-Barnard Steamers do not feel very well. Would be glad of an extra or two; but Mother is wanting. I am willing to place myself on the same par as my family, & in fact do feel to enjoy any thing that I feel is better than they have at home. I believe the Lord will open my way yet.

THURSDAY, February 7.

Writing continued. Getting ready of the Hillsburg quarterly meeting. But looked to Mother on account of must help, that, only when I am writing or performing their active duty, please I keep my eyes open. Had a good time today in reading the Bible on my knees.

Found little time to read. It is all write till the steam or papers. Rest & find comfort in God upon my knees with my Bible. I am enabled to draw near to him in prayer. Oh what a privilege!

Tempted some to-day with enough of this world's comforts & conveniences to meet any itching wants. Want something better to eat - to drink - to wear. Should I fear & love, at times, good a great way to make me feel unwell. I can restrain myself: they would me.



Having got pneumonia, I wrote Mr. Pease to-day. Sarah Jane Finley came here this morn. Poor girl looks badly - I tried long ago to get her near the doctor, but could not get the consent of others. Now she is badly off. Some difficulty in working the smaller girls write to their brother. But got it accomplished.

News from the war. 30 men came home last night. report that the work is about all done & the army on the retreat. 100 citizens killed. What a mercy. Praise the Lord. The Simon & Notank notices they say, how war enough. In Morris's recollection from Jan. 24. A good sermon.

Tryphena quite sick - fever high. The last night we have she rest till first this morning. We know not the comfort & value of good rest. While we are deprived of it. I am sensible I do not sympathize in this respect as I should. We have in our house rarely anything that disturbs our sleep. Pains & sickness are comparative strangers.

I am better today. Sent off my letter to Rev. Mr. Pease. Took Thursday into church - finished the tract for No. 5. Resumed the Greek Teacher. Tryphena is better. S.D. has been better today is better. The Clowds again pass away & light breaks in. God's Merciful name.

Homebound steamer is in - out of wood - will stay all day.

All my letters in the post office - note by steamer the case of Sierra Leone for some slips of bread - find there being none in the Republic.

This afternoon feel rather depressed & tempted, not to him, but to murmur at not having all I want

Wrote letters of introduction for Rev. Geo. Thompson to different persons in Genk & on the way there

Rev. Geo. Thompson took tea & spent part of the evening with us.

A very hard to read at 8. high wind with a shower of rain.

Bought some things for a poor colored girl, under my care at the old Mission House, S.F. Made out on two calls, sister Wilson by name. I intended going for them but heard something that turned me back. I felt some of the presence of the Lord to-day. My whole desire is united with him. He is my dearest object. I long for love him more.

Took boat, with A. Wilson & her two daughters for U. Caldwell Subst. Meet. I washed for Thompson in this. My mind must exercised. It might in view of my own want of conformity to the image & will of my Lord. Was humbled & drawn out to press for more subjection. That the trials & vexations of life, might bruise me

A prayer meeting at Sun rise  
 at 9. A glorious oc-  
 casion of strength & comfort to  
 many souls. At 10 preached

Unpacked & put upon  
their shelves the first lot  
of books, ever imported

first purchase of about  
\$30. worth. Watching the  
carpenter, & directing him

to their respective bowls.

Not well. Every day

Had a long & confidential talk with Mr. W. W. Dennis. Bought a barrel of flour from him. Paid \$14.50. Lin of Lord. Paid - 22 @ 1/2. Had Patriarchal Age till weary. Pleasant evening. Girls playing on the Accordion. First prospect to tears in prayer. No sleep till 2. No good refreshing sleep till morning.

SATURDAY, September 6.

Through with Nelson's Western Africa. This is a very convenient manual reliable in its statements, & kept by the Missionary, the merchant or any one concerned to know the history, chorography, language &c of West Af

Bro & Sister Kelly left for home this morning. After reading & other devotional exercises, spent a hour with brother Dennis in looking over White Plains quarterly camp. Found their fair in mechanical execution, correct in their details & footing, & encouraging in their representation of the state of the enterprise. Rev. W. Stokes sat in house at 5 P.M.

Did not rest well. Feel badly. Called to see P. B. Benson at our home previously agreed upon by D. & myself. He was not at the gate & I did not go. I called there to a widow who wished me to take her son. A poor dependant old man, detained a long time for no purpose.

MONDAY, October 6.

Arranging bills & papers which accumulate fast. Am left with a heart of sluggishness. It bears me down in body & in spirit. Feel grieved that I do not love my closest ones. Dare not trust a religion that dispensed with repeated & earnest efforts in the church

Called upon the Lord this morning for power towards before him in my closet to pray more fervently & profitably. Always with all prayer is the injunction of the Apostle. I feel confident that nothing important can fail to those that deserve & fulfill the spirit of this apostolic exhortation. Working in the garden planting beans & squashes, tomatoes, etc. &c.

WEDNESDAY, October 8.

Took into my family, with the hope of benefiting him & loving him a benefit to us, Samuel Thomas Robinson now about 11 years old. I have 7 children of my own; but perhaps I may do good for this orphan child & bring his blessing on our household. So be it. Amen.

Am better than I have been for several days. Am better too in my spirits. Draw nearer to the Lord - feel an greater interest & drawing towards spiritual things. I for fear to mind the things of the spirit that I may live the life of God. My last round of Quarters by meeting for 1858 begin tomorrow. May the Lord go with me & be with us all

Looked back with Rev. Newson & Bro. Horne for White Plains. Water running awfully some rain. Put up at the hotel lands. Did not go out at night. Entertaining time in family prayers. Had power to preach for the young bowed with us. They wept freely & have hopes of them

We went to the church to attend an investigation relating C.M.D. Kept till 10 & after. No meeting at 11. At 3 P.M. terrific rain. Streets flooded with water. Meeting impossible. A Sermon. Conf. Preaching at 7 1/2 by J. G. Thompson from Jer. III: 24. Not much liberty. Did not study the subject enough. Did he pray enough?

Love Feast. A blessed time. Our hearts now together. At 11. Preached from Rev. XII: 14. Some liberty. Feel God was with me. An excellent communion. Large number of communicants. Baptized 5 children after Dr. Horne had preached from Heb. XIII: 8. - Thompson at night

Breakfasted at Mrs W.'s  
 came off to Mrs H. Wash-  
 ington's, then to W. Plains  
 Jordan's steam mill, fish  
 ponds, Clay Ashland with  
 good walk to Russells; fi-  
 nally to Blacklegs &  
 home. Am thankful for  
 a spirit of seriousness, that  
 had seemed throughout  
 this meeting to possess  
 me. Let my whole heart  
 cleave to the Lord

Added supplement to Dr  
 Durbin's letters. Arranged  
 a small amount with Dr  
 Loring of \$55. Impressed in

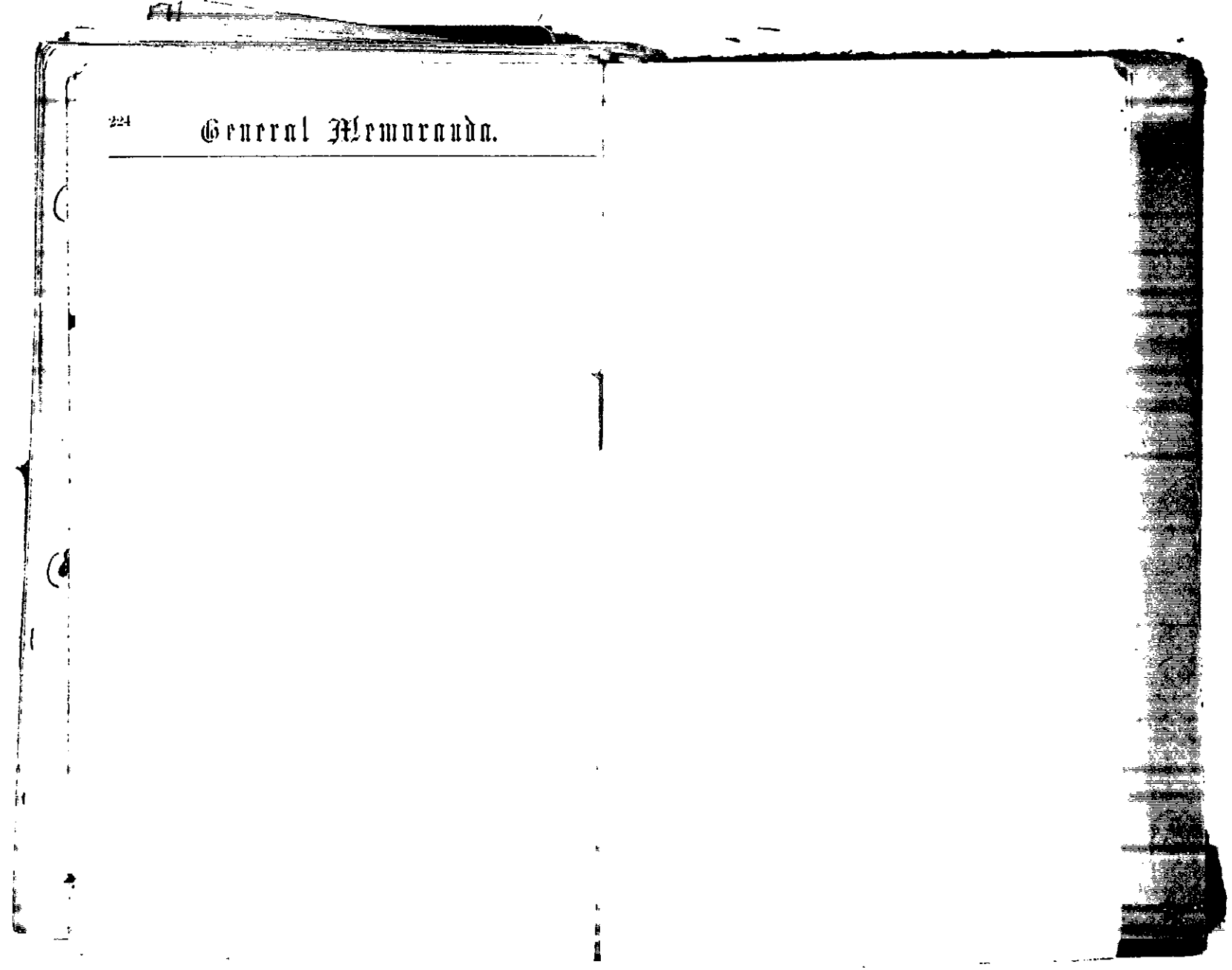

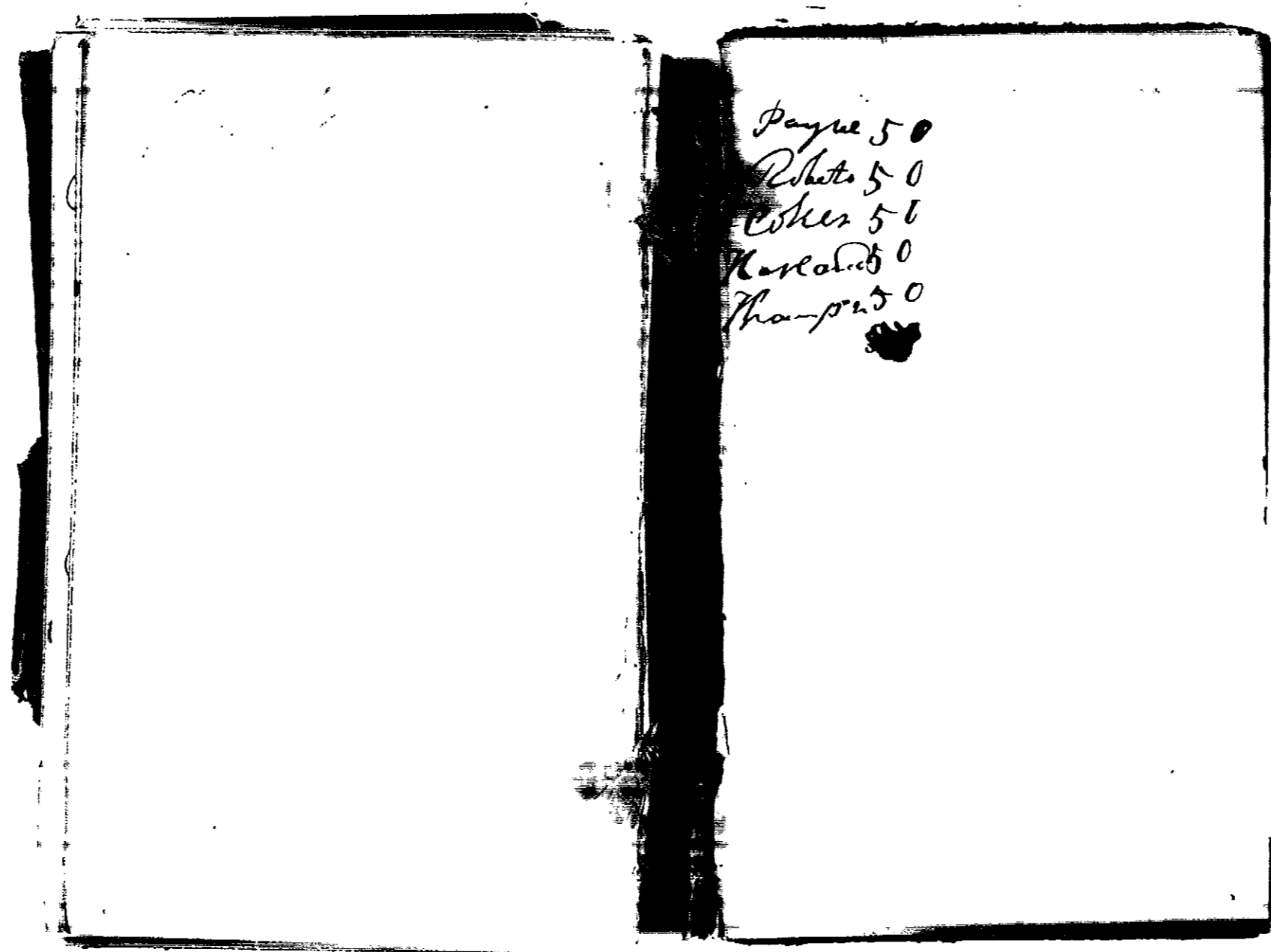
