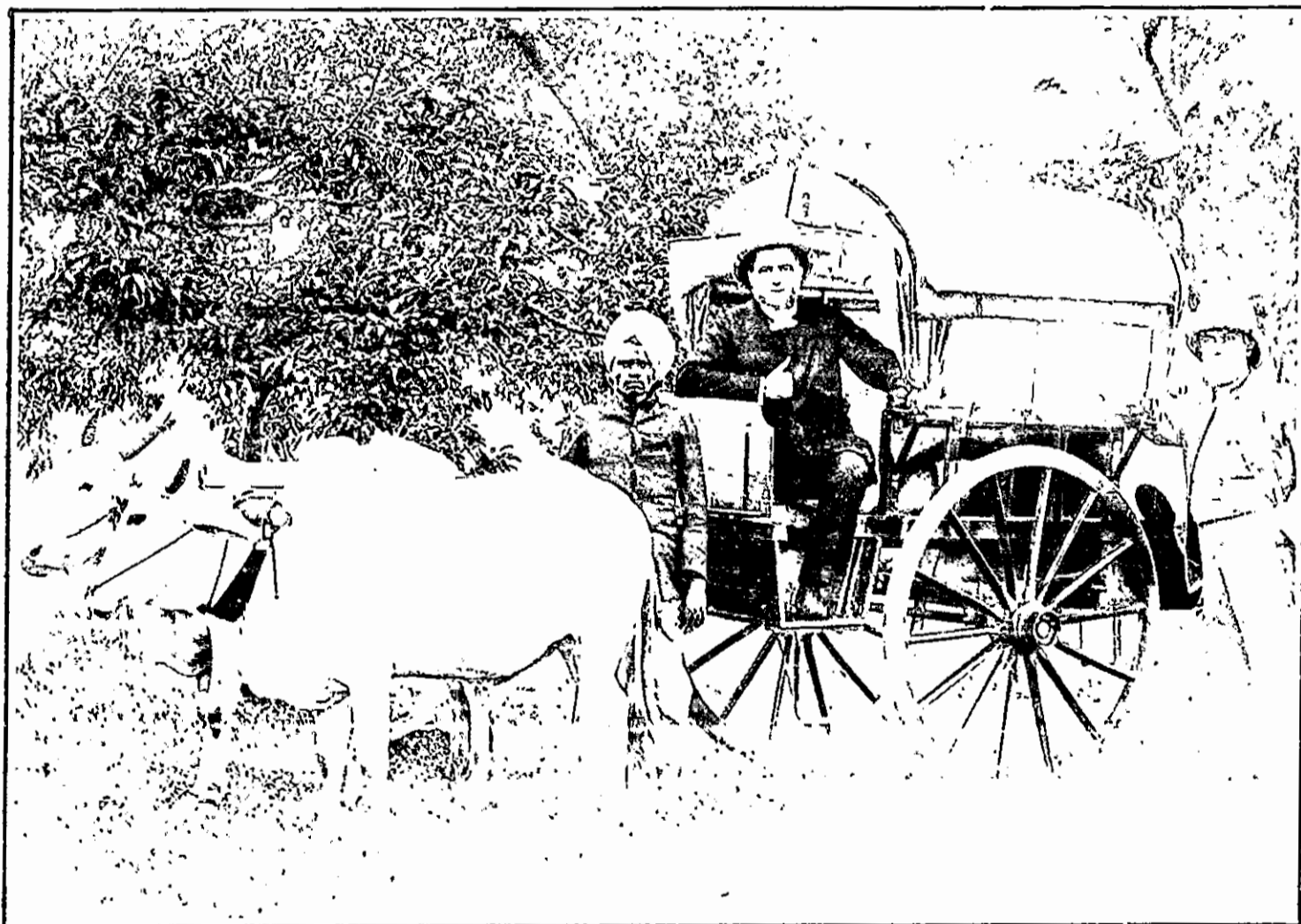

BISHOP WARNE AND A PRESIDING ELDER VISITING A DISTRICT

In the native work in India there are few settled pastorates, itinerating being the almost universal rule. The native preachers itinerate among groups of villages. The presiding elder or the missionary in charge supervises the work of a considerable number of native preachers, and must necessarily itinerate in order to direct these preachers. The bishops supervise the missionaries and native presiding elders as these are grouped in conferences, and so must travel over still wider areas. The missionary is the Rev. George K. Gilder.

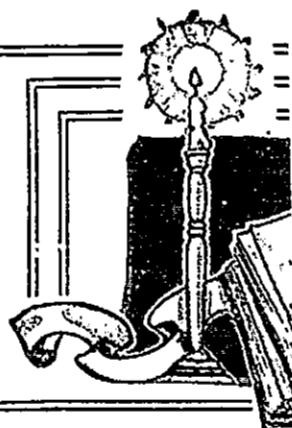

An Enigma of Life
